

DIVISION HEARING ON AGAIN THIS FORENOON

Petitioners for Establishment of Dearborn County, and Objectors to It, Will Be Heard Before Cascade Commissioners Here at 10 a.m.

Cascade county commissioners, W. F. Kester, Ben Johnson and J. R. Bennett, will at 10 a. m. this (Wednesday) forenoon resume the spirited division hearing which was adjourned last week pending investigation into a few matters which had to be clarified before the hearing could proceed.

Up to late Wednesday afternoon no new filings had been recorded by County Clerk and Recorder John Moran and Mr. Moran stated during the afternoon that he did not expect any more and that he would refuse to accept any new ones with consent of the county attorney.

Petitioners for the establishment of the proposed new county of Dearborn seek to create the new unit from portions of Cascade and Lewis and Clark counties. They must have 1,000 square miles of territory in order to have their petition granted.

The various filings have already been pretty well aired out, having been published in The Tribune last week, the

day following the commencement of the hearing. The fight seems more spirited in Lewis and Clark than Cascade county, there being plenty of opposition apparent in that county to the petition.

One of the principal things to be determined at the hearing today is whether or not the petitioners still retain sufficient territory. It is believed by some that exclusion of territory petitions filed will bring the territory the petitioners can now hold to below the required limit.

Another matter to be established is whether or not all of the signers of the original petition in Lewis and Clark county were taxpayers as required by law.

Chairman Kester, of the local county board, was unable to say Tuesday whether the hearing would be concluded today or not.

NAVY WANTS MEN FOR AIR CREWS

Chief Gunnersmate, W. F. Wolf, officer in charge of the local Navy recruiting office in the Federal building Tuesday received orders from U. S. Navy headquarters that the navy will now train mechanics for aviation. Enlistments are desired in the following ratings: Machinists, quartermaster, cooper-smith, carpenter and fabric workers. Men with experience along these lines either in army or civil life will be enlisted in higher ratings than apprentice seamen. On the other hand men who have had no experience will be sent to the aviation mechanics school at Great Lakes, Ill., provided they pass the physical requirements now in effect for apprentice seamen and must enlist for a period of three or four years.

All men will be given the choice of immediate transfer to any of the following stations: Naval training station, Great Lakes, Ill., for instruction at aviation mechanics school, Chatham, Mass.; air station; Rockaway, N. Y.; station; Cap May, N. Y.; air station; Hampton Roads, Va.; air station.

JULY AND AUGUST RAINFALL EQUAL

Up to First of September Four and One-Half Inches Fell.

July and August produced exactly the same amount of moisture locally, 37 one hundredths of an inch falling in each month, according to the official reports

of H. R. Ayer, special observer for Great Falls.

During the present year from January 1 to August 31 the total rainfall as shown on the official reports for this city has been four and 35 one hundredths. From the ninth of the month until the 31 there was not even a trace of rain recorded.

The warmest day in August was the 18 when the mercury reached 90. The coolest day was August 15 when it dropped to 44.

There were 14 clear days with 16 partly cloudy.
