

Germany Refuses to Drop Austria As Ordered

GIVES PLEDGE NOT TO GRAB FORMER ALLY, BUT WILL NOT REPULSE APPEAL FOR UNION

Meanwhile Vienna Watches Trend of Events in Hungary With Fear Old Mate Will Unite With Rumania in New Dual Monarchy.

Vienna, Sept. 5.—(By the Associated Press)—Austria is watching the trend of events in Hungary with growing apprehension. The future of that former part of the dual monarchy, it is freely said, must have a grave effect on Austria's future, which, itself, is admittedly in danger. The present ascendancy of the reactionary elements is feared here to point the road to monarchial government, either by the re-establishment of Hungary as a kingdom or the fruition of the reported Rumanian scheme for a dual Rumanian-Hungarian empire under a Rumanian king.

Activity of the royalist elements of Europe to provide for the future of the house of Hapsburg is indicated by reports from apparently good sources that approaches have recently been made to a certain high personage, with the intimation that he would be acceptable as either king or emperor of Hungary.

According to information here, the forthcoming elections in Hungary point strongly toward a monarchial success. It is said openly that the Rumanians are diligently assisting this movement, as appealing to the throng of the people.

Berlin, Sept. 5.—The German reply to the note of the allies with regard to representation of Austria in the German reichstag says the German peace delegation informed the allies, May 27, that Germany had no intention to modify the Austro-German boundaries by violence, but could not undertake to oppose a German Austrian spontaneous decree for union with Germany.

The allies had the receipt of this communication June 16, the reply says, and therefore Germany felt authorized to insert article 61 in the constitution.

The supreme council of the peace conference on September 2, sent a note couched in rather plain terms, to the German government, pointing out that the article 61 of the German constitution conflicted with article 60 of the German peace treaty, forbidding German interference in European affairs.

The article in the German constitution referred to provided for the representation of Austria in the German reichstag and the council demanded suppression of this article within a fortnight, declaring that otherwise the allies would be compelled to undertake further occupation of the right bank of the Rhine.

WILSON WILL TRY TO AVERT STEEL STRIKE BY INDUCING CORPORATION TO MEET MEN

Washington, Sept. 5.—President Wilson has agreed to undertake to bring about a meeting between representatives of the steel workers and of the United States Steel corporation, in an effort to avert a threatened strike.

The president was asked in a telegram sent some time today by Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, and the committee of steel men, to say whether a conference could be arranged before next Tuesday, when the president of the 24 international unions in the steel industry will meet here to take such action as they deem necessary.

Coerced Says Gompers.

The telegram to the president said: "The executive committee, representing the various international unions in the convention and steel industry met, today, to consider the awful situation which exists in many of the iron and steel industry centers. The coercion and brutality employed to prevent men

and unions from meeting in halls engaged upon private property or in the open air, the overbearingness of the corporations' emissaries, the wholesale disregarding of numbers of men for no reason than the one assigned, that they have become members of the union, have brought about a situation that it is exceedingly difficult to withhold or restrain the indignation of men and the resistance that they declare it is their purpose to prevent.

"The executive committee relying upon the case as presented to you last week and your earnest declaration to endeavor to bring about a conference for the honor and peaceful adjustment of the matters in controversy, have thus far been enabled to prevail upon the men not to engage in a general strike. We cannot now affirm how much longer we shall be able to exert that influence, but we ask you, even in the great work in which you are engaged, to give prompt attention to this most vital issue."

RADICALS URGED TO BALK AT WAR AGAINST MEXICO

Communists Adopt Call; Socialists Plan Grab of Trade Unions.

Chicago, Sept. 5.—Members of the national socialist party voted, today, to continue its fight in the ranks of organized labor with the object of obtaining ultimate control of trades union bodies. The plan is to form groups of socialists in every craft and shop local, which will be used for propaganda work to convert the mass of the trade unions.

The proposition was vigorously opposed by G. A. Hoehn, of St. Louis, and others, who insisted the movement had proved a failure in the past.

The convention abandoned the principles of the referendum to the extent of amending the party constitution so as to provide for the election of the national executive committee by the annual national convention of the party instead of by vote of the membership.

The size of the national executive committee was reduced from 15 to 7.

Another amendment to the constitution which was adopted requires applicants for membership in the party to take out citizenship papers.

Communists Back Mexico.

The communist labor party of America adopted a resolution, calling on all wage earners to refuse to fight in the event this country goes to war with Mexico.

Another unsuccessful effort was made, today, to unite the ex-communist labor party of America with the communist party. The constitution of the latter party provides for autonomous state federations and delegates from New York, Massachusetts and other eastern states threatened to join the communist labor party of America.

This organization issued another invitation for the communist party to unite with them but it was said the offer would be rejected.

Are Leaving Stranded.

Delegates to three conventions of radicals which have been in session a week leaving for home, today, announcing that they were broke and, as a result, the attendance was cut in half. Many of the delegates said they would have to borrow money to get out of the city.

This was especially true of delegates to the communist labor party of America and the communist party.

DECEIT CHARGED TO DISCREDIT SPRUCE PROBE

Chairman's Accusation Brings About Bitter Debate in Quiz.

Portland, Sept. 5.—Charging that a campaign of propaganda was being conducted to discredit the work of the congressional spruce investigation committee, Congressman James Frear, preliminary to calling the committee into a session, today, outlined the purposes of the investigation and declared the committee would proceed to get the facts, regardless of any influences that might be brought to bear on it in its deliberations.

The charges precipitated a tropical debate between congressman Frear and Congressman Clarence F. Moran, the democratic member of the committee, with the result that Frear declared that he would leave future examinations of General Bruce P. Disque to his two colleagues, Congressmen Magee and Lea.

No Such Resolution Passed.

Chairman Frear read into the record a telegram from J. J. Donovan, a member of the Spruce Production corporation, saying the Bellingham Washington Chamber of Commerce has passed a resolution asking that witnesses of both sides be called in the interest of fair play.

He also read a telegram from Seattle, saying the Seattle Chamber of Commerce had passed a resolution along similar lines.

He said he had telephoned to the president of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce and had been informed that the chamber never had passed such a resolution.

He also read into the record a newspaper clipping quoting Congressman Lea as having declared in a public address in Portland that his two colleagues on the committee were engaged solely by him.

The chairman then told for the committee has been appointed by congress by unanimous vote and said the reason for the investigation was that, despite the fact that more than a billion dollars had been spent in airplane production, not a single fighting plane had reached the front.

Leo Challenges Statements.

Replying to Mr. Frear, Congressman Lea stated that witnesses for the prosecution had been prevented from telling the truth and that there had been read into the records statements from the chairman of the committee regarding the aircraft production which were not true. He declared he intended to see that witnesses were given fair play.

DOOLEY FARM HAND CRUSHED TO DEATH

Is Instantly Killed When He Falls Under Wheels of Machine He Was Riding.

Pleantywood, Sept. 5.—Anton Spilde, of Dooley, was instantly killed, when the wheels of a separator, which he was moving passed over his head, mashing the head beyond recognition. Spilde, with another farm hand, was riding upon the top of a separator which they were moving to another field. The separator listed to one side and both men jumped. The engineer, however, kept on going, the separator righting itself. In some way Spilde caught his foot in the separator, while in the act of jumping, and his body was thrown directly under the wheels and died before he could be moved.


