MOUNT ANGELA OPENS MONDAY

Local Ursuline Academy Starts With Increased Departments and Instructors.

Mount Angela, the school conducted here by the Ursuline nuns, will open September 8. As heretofore day pupils will be admitted to classes at the academy. Non-resident or day pupils will be given every advantage and opportunity in school, factory, settlement and state work. The gymnasium of the Skillman New Jersey State Village for epileptics was modeled and equipped and the course of study was established and executed with marked success by Miss Maher. Miss M. Fryberger of the Gregg school of Chicago, who comes highly recommended by the instructors of that institution, will have charge of the regular courses in the commercial department, including stenographic, secretarial and office training. The new domestic science department which for the first time is this year being added to the list of other educational branches given at the academy will be under the supervision of Miss E. Meyer of Lewis Institute, Chicago, and special chemist for Morris company, Chicago. Miss Meyer who enters this department to the local institution as "one able to lead and to co-operate under leadership in her special line." The music school under the direction of Louise Valverde Kiley is already known as an institution of recognized merit throughout the state. French and Spanish will be taught as formerly by native teachers. A normal school department including a well equipped training school in which the student may observe and practice, under expert teachers, the principles of teaching and managing, will also open September 8. Students who enter this department to prepare for work in the public schools must be high school graduates. Director of Education. Miss Mary E. Doyle of Chicago University and Columbia Teachers college, New York City has been chosen director of education. Miss Doyle has had a large and varied experience in city and state public schools and comes recommended as "a progressive, efficient, and capable administrator. She is in sympathy with the idea of the free organization of the school. She has devoted much time to the larger problem of education, such as Americanization and the teaching of English to foreigners; the use and value of school buildings; the community and future citizenship." Her work is well known to many educators in Montana. Announcements concerning requests for evening classes will be made later.

WILL PROBABLY ADJOURN AGAIN

County Division Hearing Scheduled for Monday Forenoon May Be Delayed. While it is probable that another adjournment will have to be ordered in the proposed Dearborn county division hearing, County Clerk John Moran, says the county board will have to open the session at 10 a. m. Monday forenoon whether the business will be taken up further on that day or not. Two sessions have already been held, an adjournment being made at the last one to enable the petitioners in favor of the creation of the new county to file some certificates concerning the genuineness of signatures procured by them on the original petition in the Holter Dam district included in the territory asked for by the petitioners. It was expected at the time of the last adjournment that these certificates would be ready for presentation to the board by Monday morning, but the session Monday was authorized with the understanding that if they are not another adjournment will be taken.

W. M. THORNTON IS IN HOSPITAL

Former Great Falls Banker Taken Ill in San Francisco and Has Operation. W. M. Thornton, for many years and until recently vice president of the First National bank, underwent an operation for appendicitis at the Fairmont hospital in San Francisco, Saturday, advised to that effect being received here yesterday by Mrs. Thornton in telegrams from Mr. Thornton's two brothers, who are prominent attorneys of San Francisco. Mrs. Thornton will leave for that city this morning to be with him. Mr. Thornton left Great Falls a couple of weeks ago for San Francisco on a combined business and pleasure trip, expecting to be away for two or three weeks. He was taken ill five days ago with an intermittent fever and entered Fairmont hospital where it was ascertained he was suffering from appendicitis and an operation was performed Saturday. He is in the hands of the best surgeons of that city and telegrams received yesterday stated that he had passed through the operation in fine shape and was expected to make a speedy recovery.
