

NATURAL FLOW IN RIVER NOW

Big Storage Reservoir of the Montana Power Company Meets Severe Test.

No storage water is now being used to feed the hydroelectric plants of the Montana Power company. M. E. Buck, general superintendent of the company stated during a short visit to this city Tuesday.

Water formerly used for irrigation is now being turned into the Missouri and its branches, and rains have swelled the flow until there are enough second feet in the Missouri river to turn the wheels in the local plants and those at other stations operated by the company, Mr. Buck said.

Officials of the power company are delighted with the manner in which the Helgen storage reservoir met the test of an extremely dry winter followed by the driest year in nearly half a century. Some of the stored water still remains in the big reservoir on the Madison river and with the supply sufficient to meet present conditions the officials feel confident that no combination of weather can arise which the storage dam cannot meet.

VALUATION FALLS UNDER NEW PLAN

Cascade County Total Assessment Is More Than Five Per Cent Below 1918.

Now that the railroad assessment of the lines operating in Cascade county has been announced, the effect of the new system of taxation will be more fully understood and it is apparent that the net result is a reduction of the total for the assessment roll in this county. In fact the reduction is rather heavy, being more than five per cent of the total of the assessment for 1918.

Actual figures now show that the total assessed valuation in Cascade county for taxation purposes this year is less than it was in 1918 by \$2,183,296. The total for taxation purposes this year is \$39,991,669. Last year it was \$42,174,965. These figures represent approximately one-third of the true and actual valuation, which this year is \$116,809,454 with an additional \$9,097,456 representing the true valuation of the railroads in this county. The telephone company valuations have not as yet been accurately decided, the estimate being \$521,985. Including this estimate therefore, the true valuation of all property in Cascade county this year is \$127,028,895.

On railroad property the companies are to pay taxes on 40 per cent of the true valuation. Real estate will be taxed on 30 per cent, the average of all properties reaching approximately 35.

The average pay received by women time workers is about \$6.08 a week.
