SAY MOVIES MAKE BEAUTIFUL WOMEN

Sculptor and Painter Proclaim Cinema Pictures Have Much Influence.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 15.—"Girls will be psychologically affected by moving pictures," says Lorado Taft, the sculptor. "They see beautiful women on the screen; then they go home and practice for hours before the mirror. The outcome? Graceful walking, pleasant faces, fine complexions and vivacity. Still, the hoydenish and caper-cutting movie actresses are a bad influence."

Make Women Beautiful.

In the opinion of Miss Indiana Gyberson, an Irish painter who has studied in Paris and Madrid, the movies have made American women more beautiful.

"Ah, the rising generation of Chicago girls," she exclaimed. "One sees a far larger number of charming women here now. Let them talk of cabaret dancing and rich pastry ruining the attractiveness. It is the movies that are molding ever-fresh types of native beauty—new American types."

Yet she conceded that the screen plays wield an influence that will work either good or evil.

Also Produce Vamps.

"Remember the recent avalanche of 'vamps' in Chicago?" she went on. "Girls who slinker-slouched when they walked, rolled their eyes alluringly and tried to look naughty? They were copying the movie queen of the moment. Now we're getting the athletic, vigorous, smiling girl in the films. It is good. As DeMaussant said: 'All women are imitative as monkeys.' The speedy action of the films has made girls vivacious."

A prominent designer and importer of women's gowns declared the films have had an important effect on the demand for certain styles, particularly gowns of simple, classic lines and "intriguing fabrics," and a druggist reports the sale of cosmetics has increased 25 per cent since the movies became popular.

Commission Hears Railway's Petition for Higher Fares

Helena, Sept. 15.—Hearing in the application of the Helena Light and Railway company for an increase from six to ten cents for street car fares in the city and from \$2 to \$2.50 per 1,000 cubic feet of gas, was held, today, by the state public service commission.

The engineers for the commission and those for the utility locked horns over the items in the physical valuation made of the company's properties.

Mayor John Dryburgh and City Attorney E. C. Day representing the consumers, J. N. Pardee, an official of the J. G. White Engineering company of New York, holding company of the concern; C. W. Gillispie, engineer, and attorney representing the company and Frank Woody, assistant attorney general, representing the commission.

The argument over valuations started when the company engineer claimed certain items should have been included in the report of the commission's engineers. As a result the hearing was postponed until tomorrow. No consumers appeared before the board although general notice was sent out.

Contract to Be Let for Water System at Musselshell

Roundup, Sept. 15.—Bids will be received by the board of commissioners on September 27 for the construction of a waterworks system at Musselshell, plans and specifications for which may be seen at the office of Ray E. Bushnell, county surveyor. The work will be done under the special improvement district plan provided by state law. Approximately 1,508 feet of 8-inch, 2,100 feet of 6-inch and 4,780 feet of 4-inch iron or wood pipe will be required and a 50,000 gallon concrete reservoir will be constructed. The pumping station will be electrically equipped.

Woman Not Guilty of Participation in Husband's Murder

Phillipsburg, Sept. 15.—Mrs. Frank Lambert, charged with the murder of her husband, whose death occurred at his store in this place on May 10, was acquitted by a jury before Judge George M. Winston tonight. County Attorney E. M. Durfee announced that the case against Ed Sliper, charged jointly with the murder, will be dismissed tomorrow. Lambert was beaten to death at 11 p.m., and his wife who said she was in their living room behind the store at the time, declared she heard no disturbance.

Electricians Sign Wage Contract With the Power Company

Butte, Sept. 15.—Working wage contracts for another year were signed here by the Montana Power company and the representatives in Butte of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, in accordance with the referendum vote of the various locals throughout Montana. These new contracts provide a uniform wage throughout the state of \$7 for journeymen electricians. This is

no increase for the Butte and Anaconda electricians but gives wage advances to members of locals in towns where the scale previously was below that in existence in 1919 in Butte and Anaconda.

Contracts were signed Monday for all except two locals, both of which have assented to the new contract. In these cases the contract blanks failed to arrive in time to be ratified with the others.
