Local fans will be given an opportunity to see every play in the world's series through electric score boards at the Grand opera house, Manager William Steege announced Monday. Why Not a League to Settle School Football Title?

Interscholastic Elevens Plan to Decide Championship on Separate Schedules Again.

Once more Montana high schools are ready to enter a fight for the interscholastic championship under the hit and miss method of separate schedules. Along in November several schools will probably be claiming the best team in the state and unless a last minute game can be scheduled the losers will be covered with moth balls and no clear title to the championship held.

Why not an interscholastic league under a prearranged schedule which will determine the best team in the state? In basketball and in track the high school teams meet in a clear cut clash and the winner is awarded the state championship.

The fear of early season elimination can be overcome with an intelligent schedule whereby the smaller and ordinarily less powerful school teams can meet the teams which can be expected to produce the better elevens such as Butte, Billings, Bozeman, Great Falls and Missoula.

In the conferences this condition is met easily and the champion eleven generally holds undisputed laurels. Let Stevensville, Anaconda, Beaverhead, Powell, Hobson and some of the other teams from the smaller schools without the material and the coaching meet the bigger schools early in the year and then fight among themselves during the season when the bigger elevens would be competing for the honors. This would enable the exceptional small eleven powerful enough to win from the bigger schools to show its mettle and win a championship if it could and above all it would bring the big elevens together in a sensible schedule which would determine a champion.

Why not an interscholastic football league?

Series Notes

All games are scheduled to start at 2:30 p. m.

The pennant race in the American league cannot be settled before Wednesday as neither Chicago nor Cleveland plays until then.

Chicago has five remaining games to play. The percentage figures show that if the White Sox win one of their remaining games, or Cleveland loses one, Chicago will win the pennant.

Approximately 20,000 applications for world's series tickets have piled up at the White Sox park and must be returned to the senders, as the reserved box seats have all been taken.

It will be decided by lot where the ninth game should be contested should the schedule stretch out to this length. The schedule as drawn, calls for continuous playing on each day, weather permitting.

The decision to open the baseball games in Cincinnati was decided on by the toss of a coin by Louis Comiskey, son of the owner of the Chicago club, August Herrmann, president of the Reds called "heads" and won.

It was decided that 23 players on each club are eligible for series.

The first two games will be played in Cincinnati, the next three in the American league city winning the pennant of that league, then two in Cincinnati if necessary, followed by one in the American league city. The place for the ninth game, if necessary, is to be decided by lot. The umpires, who will judge the plays in the world's series games are:

American league: R. F. Nallin and William J. Evans.

National league: Charles Rigler and Emmett Guigley.

The first game is scheduled for Wednesday, October 1.

Louis Comiskey, son of Charles Comiskey of the Chicago White Sox tossed the coin for the choice of the opening game. August Herrmann selected heads and heads came.

The business representatives selected by the commission were Leslie F. Constance of Pittsburgh, who will represent the National league, and William Harbridge of Chicago who will represent the American league.

Aberdeen, S. D., Sept. 22.—Bernard Wilbur of Redfield, S. D., who is attending high school in this city, lies in a critical condition at a local hospital as a result of an injury received in football practice.

Wilbur hurt his knee in practice the first of last week and the injury was thought to be only a minor one but took a serious turn and the lad has lain unconscious since last Wednesday. It is feared he will not recover.

Tommy Milton Dodges Death at Uniontown

The uncertainties incidental to automobile racing were thrillingly illustrated at Uniontown, Pa., in the big 225 mile race held there on Labor Day, September 1. Tommy Milton, driving a Duesenberg car in which he had won two of three laps on the field, and was within 11 laps of victory, when on the 18th lap his car suddenly burst out in flames as it came down from the famous "death" curve.

With flames shooting up twenty five feet from his car Milton's battle immediately became one for his own life, instead of the \$7,500 prize money which seemed to be almost within his grasp. With consummate skill and daring he maneuvered his car into a position near the inside railing and, after pushing his mechanic out of the car and over the rail, jumped to safety, but not without receiving severe burns about the feet and hands.

Racing men immediately attacked the burning car with fire extinguishers and succeeded in putting out the fire, but not until irreparable damage had been done to the engine.
