

ACROSS CONTINENT BY AIR IN TWO NIGHTS AND DAY IS TRIP PLANNED FOR "SKY PULLMAN;" 14 PASSENGERS

A trip across the continent in two nights and a day with a load of passengers is the next feat planned for the great "Lawson Air Pullman." The big plane has made a successful flight, with passengers, from Milwaukee, Wis., to New York city and the start of the transcontinental flight is to be made from New York. The plane has accommodations for 14 passengers and a crew of two men. Those who have ridden in it claim there is less vibration and less jar riding at 90 miles an hour in the wicker chairs of the air limited than there is riding 50 miles an hour in a railroad Pullman.

MEN WHO FOUGHT FOR U. S. GRANTED FULL CITIZENSHIP

Twenty-One Ex-Service Men of Foreign Birth Granted Final Papers Without Waiting Other; Candidates Will Be in Court Today.

There are in Montana this morning 21 new American citizens who earned the right to become such by carrying arms in defense of the nation. They appeared in district court Tuesday, and, offering no proof beyond that of exhibiting their discharge papers and complying with no formalities beyond renouncing allegiance to the land of their nativity and swearing allegiance to the land of their foreign adoption, received certificates securing to them all the benefits of full citizenship. They could do this because it is the law of the land that any man of foreign birth who has served with the military forces of the United States and who has been granted an honorable discharge shall be made a citizen upon application.

George W. Taylor, United States naturalization examiner, of Seattle, briefly questioned the candidates before they took the oath, but this was more to be sure that they understood something of what is expected of a private citizen than to establish their right to petition for citizenship. All of the candidates submitted their applications on the same day of their admission, the long wait required of the ordinary applicant and a mass of other formalities being quite eliminated.

The men made citizens were: Eric C. Carlson, John Higley, Robert W. Grant, Gustav E. Anderson, Bear M. Baarson, Guglielmo Marsalli, James D. Brown, Otto L. Nielsen, Antonio del Guzzo, Mike Brillako, Edward Ingman, Gust Ingman, Thomas Retelas, Thomas Iverson, Joseph Walaitis, Ingloff Walaitis, Erik A. Maline, Herbert H. Jesson, Adolfo Mosini, Louis Mitchell and Harry Mayo.

Many of the candidates served with the overseas forces and in conducting his brief examination Examiner Tyler discovered that a number of them had received wounds in the service of the United States. One man served on three fronts and was wounded twice. He is an Austrian and told Mr. Tyle that he believed the United States was right in declaring war on his country and Germany. Another man, a Scandinavian, resisted the draft because of being an alien, but was inducted and now is glad of it. He served overseas with distinction.

Today, Wednesday, will be regular naturalization day in district court. All candidates for citizenship who are qualified to receive their final papers will be in court. The number will be increased by men classified as enemy aliens during the war period and who have been prevented until now from receiving their second papers.

WOBBLES HOLDING REGULAR MEETINGS ON BOARD STEAMER

Twenty-Five Members in Crew; Four Convicted at Ancon on Mutiny Charges.

Seattle, Sept. 23.—Quick action by Captain James J. Doyle, master of the shipping board steamer Grey Eagle, quelled what might have been a serious mutiny aboard the vessel in the Panama zone, the latter part of August, according to a letter received today by the Post-Intelligencer from the captain.

The Grey Eagle was enroute from Seattle to London. Alleged Industrial Workers of the World members of the crew, the captain's letter said, refused to obey the firemen's rules and allowed the vessel's steam to go down to 90 pounds. On August 27, Captain Doyle wrote, he locked up one alleged ring leader among the crew's agitators by the name of Hayes, confiscated a gig full of I. W. W. literature and found, from the latter, he had about 25 members of the I. W. W. in his crew who had been holding meetings regularly.

On August 28 the dreadnaught Rhode Island was sighted and "threw a scare" into the rest of the crew said the letter. Four ring leaders were then taken from the vessel at Balboa by federal officials, tried and convicted in the district court at Ancon on mutiny charges. Further details as to the ship's voyage were not given.

LOOKING FOR STATE SENATOR IN CHICAGO BEER RUNNING CASE

Chicago, Sept. 23.—Four saloon keepers were held in bonds by Federal Judge Landis today in his investigation of beer running between Wisconsin cities and Chicago. The books of several breweries have been examined and with the appearance of 130 more saloon keepers who have been summoned, additional disclosures of the methods of evading the Illinois search and seizure law are expected.

Professed ignorance of the difference between near beer and real beer got some caught in the net. The judge concluded they were evasive.

Chief of Police Becker, of Zion City, Illinois, where several trucks loaded with beer, were seized resulting in proceedings before Judge Landis, testified that State Senator Patrick J. Carroll, a saloonkeeper, and John H. Shannon, a deputy internal revenue collector, were intoxicated when arrested and that Carroll tried to bribe him. Shannon insisted he had been assigned to watch for beer smuggling and encountered Carroll in Kenosha, Wis., and that the latter asked to ride to Chicago in Shannon's automobile.

Deputy marshals have been unsuccessful in their search for Senator Carroll and a number of other cafe and saloon owners.

Safford—The body of the late Judge William H. Safford, who died at the residence of his son, W. H. Safford, Jr., 516 Seventh avenue north, is at the chapel of the W. H. George company, and the arrangements of the funeral will be announced later. Judge Safford was a member of the Masonic lodge and a past Commander of the G. A. R., and the services will be under the auspices of those orders. The interment will be in the family plot in Highland cemetery.

Schibe—Floyd Charles Schibe, the five-months-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Schibe, of 821 Seventh avenue north, died last evening. The body is at the funeral home of the W. H. George company, and the arrangements of the funeral will be announced later.
