
Peter Grasseschi Dies at Black Eagle Home

Peter Grasseschi of Black Eagle, one of the well-known residents of that section and for nearly a third of a century a resident of Cascade county, died Saturday afternoon, aged 56 years. The

body was taken to the undertaking rooms of the T. F. O'Connor company and the funeral will be held on Tuesday afternoon from the O'Connor chapel and St. Ann's cathedral with burial at Calvary. Mr. Grasseschi was for 25 years employed at the local plant of the Anaconda Copper Mining company but for the last few years he has been engaged in farming on holdings in the vicinity of Eden.
