HERE TO BOOST CUSTER ROUTE

Sheridan Commercial Club Sec-
retary Visits in Interest of
New Highway.

Seeking support for the Custer Battle-
field Scenic highway, W. D. Fisher, sec-
retary of the Sheridan, Wyoming, com-
mercial club, arrived in Great Falls
Saturday to interview local good roads
enthusiasts and officials of the local
commercial club.

The Custer battlefield highway is 1-
475 miles long running from Omaha to
Glacier national park through Great
Falls, Lewistown, Roundup, Billings,
Hardin and the Custer battlefield,
Sheridan, Gillette and Sundance, Wyo.,
Rapid City and Sioux Falls, South
Dakota and some through Sioux City
and Council Bluffs to Omaha.

After a meeting with officials of the
local commercial club Mr. Fisher was
promised the support of the local club
and an effort will be made to have a
delegate from here attend the organiza-
tion meeting of the highway to be held
in Sheridan, October 15.

Mr. Fisher stated that the Sheridan
club was ready to spend \$5,000 placing
permanent signs on the road if neces-
sary and that the new route has already
received sanction of the highway com-
missions of Iowa, Wyoming and South
Dakota with every indication pointing
toward similar official sanction by the
Montana commission.

Twenty four main highways lead into
the Custer highway and a great volume
of tourist travel is expected over the
road beginning next year.

Mr. Fisher will leave Great Falls
today to join the Diagonal Cutoff tour
from Lewistown Monday morning. The
Custer route comes over the Diagonal
cutoff into Great Falls.

SUN RIVER VALLEY TO BE INCLUDED IN DEARBORN PROGRAM

Simms Sends Delegates to Cas-
cade Mass Meeting—Will Now
Work Under Slayton Act.

Cascade, Oct. 4.—When Dearborn
county again comes before the commis-
sioners of Cascade county upon petitions
for its creation it will appear with lines
considerably altered from those of its
last appearance and will take in the Sun
river valley, including the towns of
Simms, Sun River and Fort Shaw.

This was decided tonight at a mass
meeting of interested supporters of the
county division idea held in the Pastime
theater at which the towns of Simms
and Craig were represented.

The meeting was presided over by
Frank Wheeler, chairman of the Dear-
born county division organization, and
was attended by about 75 persons. Two
automobile loads of Simms people, of
whom there were about eight, had come
over for the meeting. These repre-
sentatives expressed themselves as being
anxious to get into the proposed county
and after hearing their views it was
decided to incorporate that portion of
the Sun river valley within the new
boundaries. The line as proposed for
Dearborn county heretofore had gone no
nearer to Simms than one and a half
miles.

The delegates from Craig were still
desirous of having that portion of Lewis
& Clark county included and it will be
retained in the boundaries as during the
last campaign.

It has been decided to work this time
under the Slayton act and a start will
once be made upon the sec-
ing of the valuation. This will require prob-
ably two weeks and will be followed by
the circulation of new petitions, prob-
ably within three weeks.

was immediately placed under arrest.


Von Schultheis acknowledged his guilt
