TO REJUVENATE OLD WORKINGS

Local Company Takes Over Boss & Atlantus and Hartley Group of Neihart Mines.

After having developed properties under their control for about two years while they have been negotiating to get control of adjoining properties the Neihart Consolidated Silver Mining company has just organized and will at once start aggressive to operate properties now held by it on the Neihart hill, including in all seven properties and certain rights and interests in other claims. The Neihart Consolidated Silver Mining company is owned and officered by Great Falls people who have the faith in the proposition that is backed by real money and they believe they have property that will warrant substantial and persistent effort which will shortly mean a payroll of from 15 to 25 men in getting out ore from their mines. The company directors are Dan Tracy, W. A. Brown, L. M. McDonnell, F. R. Van de Putte, and John E. Dawson. Mr. Tracy is president, Mr. Dawson vice president, Mr. Brown treasurer and Mr. McDonnell secretary.

The first holding of this company included the two claims of the old Boss & Atlantus company to which they have now added the Hartley mine, declared to be one of the richest silver properties on Neihart hill. The Hartley was worked profitably back in the days of cheap silver when something near a half million dollars was taken from the mine and then it was abandoned. It has been getting control of this property owned by William Mueller that has delayed real activities by the Neihart Consolidated Silver Mining company as the Hartley offered special advantages to the company in handling its other properties which include the Iona, the Katie, the Mr. Maria and the Tramm with the two claims of the Boss & Atlantus making a group of seven. There are as stated, rights in certain other claims held by this company.

Work of unwarranted the Hartley will be started at once, a man having been sent to the mine to arrange details to complete that work and as soon as that has been done taking out ore will be started. The Hartley is the leading silver producing mine of the group and one of the foremost if not the best silver producer on the Neihart hill. When the silver market was dull and inactive, this mine turned out 150 cars of ore that averaged \$1,700 in value to the car and was getting into the best leads found there when it was abandoned because of the lethargy of the silver market.

Under the present price of silver, ore as low as nine ounces in silver can be profitably operated and it is known that there is much on the dump of the Hartley that will run as high as 40 to 50 ounces to the ton in silver. The company proposes to take advantage of this fact and handle much of the ore that is on the dump as well as to actively get out as much of the better ore as is possible. They will accordingly install whatever new machinery may be required and endeavor to make their mine a busy center for the Neihart camp.

New investors have been recently turned toward the Neihart camp and there is a keener interest there than has been shown for years. The bill now has some 200 miners taking ore from the various mines and recently a 150-ton concentrator has been put into operation which will be enlarged, if the advice of the engineer for the owning company is followed, until it has a capacity of 500 tons. This would afford the Neihart Consolidated company a chance to handle its ores at this concentrator. The Neihart Consolidated proposes to electrify its mine at once, there being only the necessity of running a line one mile from the Montana Power company's line to bring this about.

According to Mr. Dawson, vice president, and Mr. Brown, the treasurer of the company, the enterprise is backed by men who believe in their properties

and will finance them to the extent needed to make them paying producers, there having been no wide distribution of stock as is so often the case in mining enterprises. This small group of men became mutually interested in their undertaking and they have now developed it until they are convinced beyond doubt that they have a very valuable property in their group of claims, of which the Hartley is the principal one.
