### Ruether Is Slated to Take Box Against the White Sox Today

Winner of Opening Game Will Probably Be Moran's Selection—Kerr for Sox.

Chicago, Oct. 6.—With the Reds victorious in four out of the five games, Manager Moran, of the triumphant Cincinnati club, indicated, tonight, that he would start Walter Ruether again against the White Sox in the sixth game of the series scheduled for Cincinnati tomorrow.

Ruether pitched the Reds to a 9 to 1 victory in the opening game of the series and has been clamoring for a return engagement against the Chicagoans. Manager Gleason's pitching selection undoubtedly will be Dick Kerr, the diminutive right hander, who scored Chicago's only victory in the series. He pitched a remarkable game, holding the Reds to three hits and is ready to face them again.

"It's all over but the shouting," said Manager Moran tonight. "We'll win again tomorrow, no matter whom Gleason pitches. My players feel that the world's championship is already theirs. The Reds have played championship ball all the way through and I am proud to be their manager."

"Eller pitched one of the greatest games that ever won a world's series today. He couldn't be touched." Manager Gleason, of the Sox, also gave credit to Eller, but declared that the Sox were not playing the brand of baseball that won them the American league pennant.

"The team has not shown itself to be the pennant machine, that won the American league flag," he said. "Everything has been against us. The players weren't right today, but that does not detract from Eller's great pitching. He beat us with great pitching and deserved the victory."

"The Sox will fight until the last man is out. Although the odds are against us, we are not quitters. I have every hope that we'll win out yet. Stranger things have happened. I expect to start Kerr tomorrow, if he's right he'll win."

### Dogge's Growl Beats Board to Cincinnati Progress at Theater

Scoreboard Operator Tips Off Red Moves as He Reads Before Mechanism Shows Them.

There was plenty of interest at the score board in the Grand opera house yesterday for all classes of fans but, of course, the Cincinnati fans got the most of the pleasure out of it. It was the fifth game between the Cincinnati Reds of the National league team and the Chicago White Sox of the American league. It was the fourth win for the Cincinnati team and therein was found the pleasure for the Cincinnati fans for it leaves but one game to win in order to claim the world's championship pennant in the great sport of baseball.

Oscar Dogge was once more working the wire and again had the growl with him—the growl of joy induced by victory or picking the winning team whichever one wants to interpret it. Anyhow, Dogge growled and when he growled there was great joy in the midst of the Cincinnati fans. It was a day when he had a right to growl for once more the Cincinnati team shut out the opposing players without a run and with so few hits that they are hardly worth mentioning.

But there were times when things looked threatening. Just at those times the Cincinnati players showed their quality by cutting off that hope and turning it into bitter defeat. One of the thrills came at the very close of the game when Weaver came to bat with two out and lined out a three base hit. But it was one of the hopeless and useless efforts for the next man up was out, retiring the side.

The electric score board reproducing the plays for the fans just as they are made on the field at Chicago is proving a great attraction for lovers of baseball and yesterday the crowd was the largest for the series. Every play is presented just as made on the diamond, the lights leaving only slight effort on the part of the observer to believe he is watching the players on the diamond. The manipulation of the board was quite satisfactory and the wire service was excellent. When Eller, pitching for Cincinnati, struck out six men in a row, there was real excitement in the theater and many in the audience rising and cheering and a few threw hats into the air as a result of their joy.

According to Manager William Steege, Gerald Frary is authority for the statement that Eller's work in striking out six men consecutively marks a new world's record for that work and Bill says that Frary claims there has been nothing approaching Eller's record since 1886, as Steege and Frary remember the record. One in the audience, when the announcement was made, declared that the authorities were in error as the record dated earlier than 1886 and was made in Ireland.

### Good Pitching Drops Averages

Chicago, Oct. 6.—Both the Cincinnati and Chicago clubs suffered a slump in their batting today as a result of the great pitching duel waged between Claude Williams, the star southpaw and Hod Eller, Moran's great right hander. The former held the national league champions to four hits while the American league representatives gathered only three of the offerings of Eller. Tonight the clubs are separated by 23 points, with the advantage in favor of the National league club. Cincinnati is hitting for a goodly average of .213, compared to .190 made by the Chicago club.

Four men on the Moran aggregation are above the selection of "300 mark." They are Ruether, with his perfect score of 1,000; Wingo and Fisher .500, Eller with .333.

On the Sox aggregation, four men are hitting in the select crowd, but none has a perfect average. McMullin leads the American leaguers with a mark of .500 while Joe Jackson, the mighty slugger of the American is batting .331. Schaik has an average of .305 while Weaver is just under the wire with .300. The National league club has made 30 hits in 141 times at bat, while its rival has gathered 29 in 133 times at bat.

### Lipton Challenges Once More for Cup Won by U. S. Yacht

Shamrock IV Will Make Fourth Effort to Lift America's Cup in 1920.

New York, Oct. 6.—Formal announcement of the receipt of a challenge for the American cup from the Royal Ulster yacht club of Belfast, Ireland, was made today by Secretary Greer A. Cormack, of the New York Yacht club.

The challenge was forwarded in behalf of Sir Thomas Lipton who named Shamrock IV as the yacht to be used in the races of 1920.

No answer has been made by the New York Yacht club but a favorable reply is expected.

Sir Thomas made his fourth attempt to lift the America's cup in 1913 with a challenge for a race the following year. The challenge was accepted and the challenging yacht, Shamrock IV was en route to this country under its own sails when war was declared. Shamrock IV put into Bermuda and later reached this port after the danger of capture by German ships had passed.

With the beginning of the war the international yacht race was abandoned and the Shamrock IV was placed in dry dock in Erie basin.

### World Series Notes

Chicago, Oct. 6.—The teams left at 10 o'clock tonight, for Cincinnati, where the sixth and, perhaps, final game of the series is scheduled for tomorrow. If a seventh game is necessary, it will be played in Cincinnati Wednesday.

The Reds were in a hilarious frame of mind after the game. They slapped each other on the back yelling that tomorrow's game would find them baseball champions of the world.

Twelve special trains were required to transport the baseball players, newspaper men and fans to Cincinnati tonight.

"Kid" Gleason still wears his cap on the side of his head, but he wasn't much in evidence on the coaching line today. Moran, however, coached his players from the first base line.

Eddie Murphy, the Sox pinch hitter, had a chance again today, but he fanned. He is participating in his fourth world's series and will draw a player's share of the receipts for going to bat twice so far in the series, plus whatever else he may do in the remaining games.

The total attendance for the five games was 158,091. The attendance for the three Chicago games was 96,868.

When the Sox got two men on bases in the first with only one out, Moran sent League to warm up. But Eller came through with colors flying and pitched record-breaking ball.

The crowd gave Eller a great ovation when he came to bat in the sixth. He connected with a triple that started the series to victory. He fanned the next time up.

The crowd of 34,379 was the biggest of the series. There were thirteen more persons jammed in the park than on Saturday. Every inch of space was occupied and thousands and thousands were turned away.

Scalpers got as much as \$20 for a box seat.

Eller retired the Sox on five pitched balls in the sixth.

Larry Kopf, the Red's shortstop, got the first hit of the game for Cincinnati in the sixth. He singled to right.

Buck Weaver, the Sox third baseman, staged a batting rally all by himself, in the ninth with two out. His triple was the only long hit the Sox made.

Chicago, Oct. 6.—Eller was applauded when he returned to the bench after setting a world's series strike out record of six in a row.

Walsh announced that in addition to this fight he had a verbal agreement with Herman that if the latter still has the title after the New Orleans fight, he will meet Joe Burman for the championship at Denver in January.


