

NINE AUTO TRUCKS IN USE GRAVELLING SUN RIVER ROAD

Contractors Have Mile and Half Surfaced and Expect to Complete Work Between Vaughn and Town of Sun River Before Winter Sets in.

Trucks, furnished by the government and secured under rental conditions from the Montana highway commission, are moving gravel at a rapid rate upon the

Sun river road west of this city and up to the time work was suspended Wednesday afternoon due to the snow storm, a stretch of about one and one-half miles of the road had been graveled.

Nine trucks are now being employed by the contractors, White, Brown & Leahy, of this city, and they have applied for eight more if they can be furnished. Of the nine trucks in use four are Nash quads, capacity two cubic yards each, while the other four are Velies, capacity three cubic yards each. All are fitted with hydraulic hoists, permitting dumping without manual effort. These are all new machines which had never been put into service before being turned over by the government. They were shipped to Deer Lodge where the bodies and hoists were attached and then turned over to the renters who drove them overland from Deer Lodge to this place, a four days trip.

Buck Snow Drifts.

On the way over the trucks had a hard pull through the mountains, encountering two feet of snow at points. They are being rented at \$10 for each day they are worked, the contractor furnishing drivers and fuel.

White, Brown & Leahy have found in the five days the trucks have been employed upon this contract that they make between 25 and 30 miles per day each, loaded and empty and with the present distance of haul they are delivering about 15 loads each per day.

The trucks are taking gravel from a pit on the Sun river at the Charles Dorrance ranch about two miles up the river from Vaughn. It is brought up and deposited in the truck beds by means of a 45-ton Marion drag line excavator. Graveling the road is now under way from Vaughn towards Sun River. There is sufficient gravel at this point to surface about four miles of road after which the excavator will be moved to another pit farther up the river.

Using Big Caterpillar.

The contract under which this firm is working calls for the grading and gravel surfacing of the road from the Great Falls city limits to the bridge

crossing the Sun river at the town of Sun River. This is a federal aid project and will cost \$85,000.

The grading consists principally of shaping up of the dirt crown, there being very little excavating or filling to be done. The contractors are using a 120 horse power caterpillar engine, likewise secured from the state highway commission, this being used to pull a blade grader.

The contract requires that the dirt road crown be 22 feet in width with a gravel surface 16 feet in width, five inches in thickness at the edges and seven inches at the center.

REDUCE HAZARDS FIREMEN'S PLEA

Members of Great Falls Department Teaching Fire Prevention Methods.

Members of the Great Falls fire department have been doing missionary work on an extensive scale during the last few days to educate the people of the city to the need of everybody helping to reduce the fire hazard. The firemen quietly perform that same sort of service 12 months of the year, but during what is known as "fire prevention week" they redouble their energy and conduct a campaign for that purpose. The plans of the campaign were laid to include personal attention to the schools and a word to the school children, which was circulated through printed sheets calling attention of the juveniles to the ways in which every child in the city can help with the work.

Clean out the attic, remove rubbish from every other place in the house and make it free from fire dangers, is the appeal of the firemen to every home owner and every occupant of property. It is not safe to pile chairs and other pieces of furniture in a closet merely to get them out of sight when they become worthless or are no longer desired for use.

No matter if it is grandmothers' armchair or grandfathers' clock, they say, if they have served their usefulness, get them into the furnace and remove the dangers of fire which they would add if stowed away in the attic or the basement or a closet or a spare room. Follow the same rule as to old papers and magazines. If they are not worth binding and keeping in orderly fashion in a case, burn them and free the home from danger.

Those promoting the work of fire prevention will dance this Thursday evening with the Great Falls firemen at the Masonic temple, as this is the event that is expected to round out this year's campaign promoting the work of fire prevention in Great Falls.

Salvation Army Plans Special Services Here

Special services will be conducted by the Salvation army on Saturday, Sunday and Monday. Colonel J. W. Cousins, of Denver, Colo., and provincial officer of the army will arrive in Great Falls Saturday afternoon and will take charge of them.

The first will be a street service Saturday evening on or near Central avenue. The services of Sunday night will be the special Salvation army service for the dedication of a baby. This is sometimes called a service where a baby is given away. The baby to be given away or dedicated to the Salvation army service is but one month old and the child of officers of branch work of the local army.

On Monday evening special services will be conducted at the cathedral in conclusion of Colonel Cousins' annual visit.



BOARD OF HEALTH WARNS AGAINST FLU

Authorities Nervously Await Recurrence of Dreaded Epidemic.

Medical authorities seem to be of the opinion that this country will again be visited by the dreaded scourge of influenza, and have already taken steps to warn the public as to the precaution that should be observed.

The board of health of the state of Connecticut has had large placards printed and widely distributed containing the following advice, which will be found valuable in any locality, its purpose being to avoid, if possible, a recurrence of this dreaded epidemic.

How to Avoid the Flu.

1. Don't inhale any person's breath.
2. Avoid persons who cough and sneeze.
3. Don't visit close, poorly ventilated places.

7. For the protection of others, cover your mouth when you cough or sneeze.
8. Clean your teeth and mouth frequently.
9. Don't spit on the floor.
