## Several Surprises Mark Eastern Football Games

### Nebraska and Minnesota Tie—Yale Scored on by Fluke—Army Loses to Syracuse—Penn and Pitt Good—Cornell Barely Wins From Williams—Utah Teams Shine—Montana Elevens Open Without Fireworks.

College football carried several surprises yesterday. Probably the biggest surprise of the day was the tie between Minnesota and Nebraska. This game shows Iowa, through the defeat of Nebraska 18 to 0 last week, as one of the powerful elevens of the middle west once more. It does not mean that Minnesota is not strong but that Nebraska is not necessarily weak. Wisconsin by scoring only 16 points against Marquette can be considered as making one of the poorest showings of the day. Especially as Marquette threatened to score several times. Either the Great Lakes team "ain't what it used to be" in war times or Chicago has a whole of a team to roll up 124 points against the sailors. Probably peace time poorness on the part of the navy. Illinois in her opening game shattered no records by winning from Purdue 14 to 7. If the 1918 champions are to win from Ohio and other conference teams they need a lot of work down in camp. Ohio trimmed Cincinnati 45 to 0 and still appears dangerous in the conference. Northwestern won from Depauw 20 to 0. Both these scores are of little value in conference comparisons except to show that these elevens have possibilities. In the extreme east Pittsburgh and Pennsylvania continued in their championship form. Today these elevens appear to lead the field, at least outside the New England group. Penn has a bear team, scores indicate. And Pitt trounced her old rival West Virginia. Yale suffered the humility of a score in her second game against North Carolina. But the score was a fluke and the blue team will yet be a factor. At present it appears a long ways back toward the top of the conference. The Tigers had a hard time winning from Lafayette, always a stiff competitor for the Princeton team. Harvard romped through Colby at will. Still the Crimson has much room for improvement. Cornell managed to win from Williams by a single goal. There will be no bonfires at Ithaca when the big Red line crossed after being outplayed the team now. The Navy shone and the army didn't in the games again this week. Syracuse trimmed West Point and it will take lots of work along the Hudson to check the flotilla this year. Missouri and Kansas Aggies opened the Missouri valley conference with a tie. Both Utah schools showed promise, the varsity whipping Colorado college 20 to 0 and the Aggies taking an Idaho prep school at Pocatello and trimming the poor boys 136 to 0, a season's record to date. Neither Montana schools showed any wonderful strength. The Aggies, even though losing, probably giving their supporters more satisfaction in the Wyoming game than the varsity did by winning from Wesleyan and having the goal line crossed after being outplayed a larger part of the game. This little Aggie-Varsity game promises much as a result of the first contests by both elevens yesterday. California was the only coast team to play yesterday and its win from St. Mary's an Oakland college, was none too big, 19 to 0. Penn Powerful Philadelphia, Oct. 11.—The University of Pennsylvania football team over-

whelmingly defeated Delaware college at Franklin field today, 89 to 0. NEBRASKA ELEVEN SURPRISES MINNESOTA AND GETS TIE Minneapolis, Oct. 11.—Effective open play in the last half, which was too much for the powerful but inexperienced Minnesota eleven, enabled Nebraska to play a 4 to 0 contest here this afternoon. Nebraska lost to Iowa last Saturday and the tie was a setback to Coach Williams' men. The game was fiercely fought, particularly in the closing quarter, when each team fought desperately to break the deadlock. Minnesota got its touchdown in the second period by smashing through the Nebraska defense from the middle of the field until Haertel went over. Nebraska worked the ball to Minnesota's 8-yard line in the third period, only to lose it on downs. In the closing period Nebraska opened up with every thing they had. Starting from Minnesota's 40-yard line, Dale made eight yards and Dodson plunged through for a first down. Then Shellenberg, who had replaced Quarterback McGlasson, got away and sprinted 30 yards for a score. Neither team could kick a goal after its touchdown. In the closing minutes of the rough battling Nebraska was penalized half the distance of the field for slugging and McKellogg, who left the game, was succeeded by Dana. Minnesota tried a forward pass, but Dodson intercepted it on Nebraska's 28-yard line and the Gophers' last rally was broken. HARVARD LOOKS STRONG AGAINST COLBY ELEVEN Cambridge, Mass., Oct. 11.—Harvard found Colby unexpectedly weak today and second and third string players had little difficulty in running up a score of 35 to 0 against the visitors. Colby's only chance at a score came in the second period, when, after a 20-yard dash by Jacobs through nearly the entire Harvard team, Buckman made a shot for the goal, standing on the Crimson 43-yard

line. The kick went wide by 10 yards. The first Harvard score came on a fumble by Colby in the first rush of the game, and the second through a 25-yard dash by Casey from a punt, followed by another dash by that player around right end. The third touchdown followed nine plunges from the 30-yard line. The fourth march for the goal line started on Harvard's 45-yard line and eight rushes, including three forward passes, carried the ball over. The fifth and final touchdown came through a 23-yard dash by Felton, from a punt caught on the Harvard 45-yard line and seven scrambles, the last being from a fourth down on the 5-yard line, when Steele caught a forward pass standing behind the Colby goal posts. YALE SCORED ON BY NORTH CAROLINA FLUKE New Haven, Conn., Oct. 11.—Yale defeated North Carolina in an inter-sectional football game today, 34 to 7. The playing was listless except for a few flashes of misdirection from the blue back field men. The visitors scored a touchdown in the last few minutes of play by falling on their own punt behind the goal line after a Yale player touched the ball. North Carolina was unable to penetrate the blue line. Coleman outkicked the Yale backs, booting a couple for sixty yards. Yale scored in the first few minutes after North Carolina fumbled the kickoff. Another touchdown came in the second period after Laroche made a fifty yard run. Seven more points were added to the Yale total in the third period. The period ended with the ball on the visitor's one yard line, Laroche going over for a touchdown at the opening of the last quarter. With the second team in the fray, Braden scored the final touchdown for Yale, after which North Carolina made its score. MONTANA AND WESLEYAN PUT UP STIFF CONTEST Missoula, Oct. 11.—After playing the heavier state university team to an even break for nearly three quarters of the game, Montana Wesleyan gave out before the plunging drives of the Bruins here this afternoon, losing 26 to 7. Montana scored first with a touchdown in the third quarter, and in the next play after the kickoff, Fullback Balior of Wesleyan threw a forward pass to Ganser, who ran 60 yards for Wesleyan's touchdown. In the following quarter, two forward passes and a smashing attack gave Montana three touchdowns. MISSOULA HIGH RALLIES Missoula, Oct. 1.—After being outplayed 7-6 in the first quarter, Missoula high school rallied and won from Stevensville high at the latter's field today, 29-13. NORTHWESTERN, 20; DEPAUW, 0. Chicago, Oct. 11.—Northwestern university opened its football season today

with a 20 to 0 victory over Depauw university, Koehler, the northwestern full back and captain, was injured at the start of the second quarter and forced to retire. O'Neil, the Depauw quarterback, suffered a broken jaw in the third quarter. PITTS BEATS OLD RIVAL. Pittsburgh, Oct. 11.—The University of Pittsburgh football team defeated West Virginia university today 28 to 0, in a game that was played on a field of mud and water. A heavy rain fell most of the time and fumbling was in evidence throughout the contest. BADGERS ARE LUCKY. Madison, Wis., Oct. 11.—Wisconsin in its last game before opening its Western Conference season, defeated Marquette university 13 to 0 today, although playing the defensive most of the time. Wisconsin scored in the first quarter, line plunges netting the touchdown after a forward pass, Davey to Weston, had brought the ball from midfield to Marquette's ten yard line. Marquette immediately afterward marched to within three yards of Wisconsin's goal but Chicago fumbled as he was crossing the line.
