PLAN BALL FOR ARMISTICE DAY

American Legion Will Celebrate Victory Over Germany With Big Public Dance Nov. 11.

As part of the celebration of armistice day, Nov. 11, the Great Falls branch of the American Legion will hold a big victory military ball in the Masonic temple that evening.

This was decided at the regular meeting of the legion Monday evening after Lewis Osterle of the Knights of Pleasure dancing club had won the respect of the legion by offering to turn over his option on the hall for that evening so the soldiers might hold the big ball. A general observance of the day, the first anniversary of the cessation of hostilities, is hoped for by the soldiers.

In appreciation of Mr. Osterle's kindness the legion accorded him a vote of thanks.

It was also decided to hold monthly dances under the auspices of the legion and under the direction of the entertainment committee.

A report from the finance officer, C. Davidson, showed that the legion took in \$1475 at the two performances of the minstrel show. A detailed statement of the proceeds and the profit will be issued through the press as soon as all the bills are received. At this time the amount received as a percentage of the second performance receipts for the auditorium fund will be announced.

The legion served notice that no bills against the organization will be paid hereafter unless the purchase is requisitioned through the finance officer, Charles Davidson.

Arrangements to take over the soldiers' employment bureau and handle it at the legion clubhouse with the cooperation of the Red Cross are now being completed and the bureau expects to open in about one week.

Other business transacted by the soldier organization at the meeting Monday night include the appointment of committees and a decision to support the campaign for a memorial fountain at the head of Central avenue. A committee was named to work with the park board in the selection of a design or in the development of sentiment in favor of the fountain. The legion will not, however, solicit funds or aid in an effort to raise money for the fountain.

These artists have been identified in principal parts with some of the best opera companies and every one of them is an artist of recognized ability and as the result of training by the masters in the line.

BEAN WILL BRING PEACOCK TO MONT.

Deputy Leaves for Michigan City to Return With Suspected Check Artist.

Deputy Sheriff W. C. Bean left Monday for Detroit, Michigan, to return with E. M. Peacock, accused by a bank at Belt of cashing a raised check. Extradition papers for Peacock were prepared by County Attorney H. G. Bennett and will be used in case the prisoner changes his mind in regard to returning to Montana voluntarily. After his arrest in Michigan, Peacock said that he would waive extradition.

It is alleged that Peacock raised a \$15 check to one calling for \$1500, cashed it at a bank at Belt and left the state. He was arrested at Detroit Saturday by a representative of the Burns detective agency and will be tried here, it is understood, on a larceny charge. Officials have evidence going to show that the suspect wrote a check for \$15, payable to "cash," at a Chicago bank and later, by altering the figures and adding the word "hundred" to the writing, made it appear that the voucher was originally drawn for \$1500.
