POULTRY SHOW DATES ARE SET

State Secretary Dorsh and Local Association Agree to Hold Event January 19-24.

Dates for the state poultry show to be held in Great Falls were set Monday evening at a conference between members of the local association and J. L. Dorsh, of Butte, secretary of the State Poultry Breeders association, as January 19 to 24.

Mr. Dorsh announced that the state rabbit breeders association formed at the poultry show in Butte last winter, will join the poultry association at the local exhibition. Besides a large number of poultry entries from Montana fanciers and scores from outside the state, the show will contain a large display of Belgian hares and pedigree rabbits.

Ed Hayes, poultryman for the Dakota Farmer, will judge the poultry entries, Mr. Dorsh announced. Mr. Hayes gave general satisfaction as judge at the recent Midland Empire fair at Billings.

Arrangements for the holding of the show in the new Johnson hotel building were discussed at the conference. There are now available 400 association coops and it is planned to borrow 400 more from the state fair association, Mr. Dorsh announced.

Cash prizes with a total value of \$800 will be distributed at the show. In addition special prizes with a value of \$200 will be awarded to the winners.

This year, for the first time, the entries for the coop prizes must be separate from the singles with a separate entry fee.

Another Opportunity for Public Service

Announcement was made Monday by Charles O'Reilly, civil service examiner in charge of examinations given at the local post office, that in addition to the vacancies in the internal revenue bureau of the treasury department of the United States civil service commission, to be filled from an open competitive examination for automobile mechanic on October 28, 1919, it is expected to fill a vacancy in the fuel yard, bureau of mines, Washington, D. C., at \$13.20 per year, unless it is found in the interest of the service to fill any vacancy by reinstatement, transfer or promotion.

Application for this examination must be filed with the Commission at Washington prior to 6 p. m. on October 28, 1919.

GENERAL RAIN OVER MONTANA

Precipitation in Great Falls Duplicated Everywhere East of Mountains.

Slightly less than half an inch of moisture fell in Great Falls Monday, but this section was no more fortunate than nearly all other parts of the state east of the mountains. People who had opportunity to get in touch with different points by telephone learned that the local precipitation was duplicated everywhere east of Helena and Glacier park.

At the Great Northern dispatcher's office it was stated that all territory included in the Butte division was experiencing rain in the same amount falling here and that prospects for its continuing appeared to be excellent.

Covering as it did the country in which practically all of the state's winter wheat crop had been sown, the rain was undoubtedly of greater value than any other falling this season.

The sowing of winter wheat will, as usual, be continued until about November 1, and it is likely that with the amount of moisture now in the ground the acreage will be considerably enlarged over what appeared probable last week.
