

New York Market

FINANCIAL. New York, Oct. 21.—Dealings on the stock exchange, today, differed in no important particular from recent sessions, the market again concentrating to an extraordinary degree in speculative issues.

Traders for the long account had an added incentive in the easiest money market so far this month. Call loans opened at six per cent, large amounts being supplied at that figure, which ruled throughout the day. The turnover was slightly under Monday's, but the market was fully as large. Steels for example, were at substantially higher levels. United States Steel coming within a point of its high for the current movement on a two-point rise to 113 1/2. Kindred shares rose two to four points, steel and electric equipments one to five, and leather, food and several of the less distinctive specialties, two to eight points.

All the movements were relayed by the further advance of motors and oils. General Motors again led at an extreme gain of 1 1/2 points. Mexican Petroleum also established a new maximum at 23 1/2, and Royal Dutch and Texas Company bounded forward at the end, the latter rising 11 points to its best record at 209.

Sales amounted to 1,725,000 shares. Bonds were irregular including Liberty and foreign issues. United States Steel, while Paris 6's strengthened. Total sales (par value) aggregated \$14,326,000. Old issues, 102 1/2; bids, 102 1/2. Marks: unchanged. Time loans, fair demand; 60, 90 days and six months, 6; closing bid, 5; offered at 6, last loan, 6.

Chicago Market

GRAIN AND PROVISIONS. Chicago, Oct. 21.—Severe breaks in the value of hogs more than outweighed all other factors in the corn market, today. The result was a heavy close, 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 net lower with December \$1.23 1/2, to \$1.23 1/2, and May \$1.21 1/2, to \$1.21 1/2. Oats finished 3/4 to 1/2 net lower, and provisions unchanged to 1/2 net down.

Notwithstanding that corn opened sharply higher, sentiment quickly reversed itself. The upturn at the start was due entirely to announcement that on October 25 the railroad administration would restore the individual permit system for the movement of grain. Through this change of methods, the arrival of corn at primary markets was expected by many traders to be much curtailed. Knowledge, however, that under the weight of excessive supplies the hog market was undergoing a big tumble took the lead soon as the dominating factor in regard to corn, especially after word came that the hog prices in some cases had dropped \$1 a hundredweight within 24 hours and that fully 15,000 hogs here would be left over tonight unsold.

Soviet forces seem still to be holding the central region west of Petrograd, the Helsingfors dispatch telling of a duel between an anti-bolshevik fleet and the fort at Krasnaia Gorka. A great fire, accompanied by an explosion, was observed after the battle but it is said it may have been at rainierman, a village about 12 miles east of Krasnaia Gorka.
