SETTING RECORD FOR PEACE TIMES

Red Cross Home Service Helps 3,000 Vets in Single Month.

Now and then someone wonders as to the necessity of maintaining the Red Cross since the war is over. A visit to the home service office of the Red Cross in the Ford block in this city and a little inquiry as to what is going on there would soon convince anyone as to the amount of service being rendered by the organization and the great necessity for that service. As a matter of fact, so far as the home service is concerned, there is greater need for it now than there was during the war, and the work that it is doing for the returned soldiers is very much more extensive than it was called upon to do for them and their families during the war. This may be better understood when it is stated that during the past month the home service of the Cascade county chapter rendered something like three thousand distinct services to or for returned soldiers during the past month.

That is, the executive secretary, Mrs. Carrier, or some one of the young ladies in the office wrote a letter concerning some subject in which an ex-soldier was interested, held a conversation with someone on a similar subject, helped out insurance papers, furnished information or was of some assistance in connection with a soldier's bonus, travel pay or something else, three thousand times. Nor is that all that the home service is doing. Besides its work for the returned soldiers, it is at work on the peace program of the Red Cross, a work which it is intended to keep up permanently. In a general way that relates to the health of the community, as was so well illustrated by the work of the home service during the influenza epidemic a year ago, but just at present the local home service department of the Red Cross is giving particular attention to the necessity for relief work brought about by the crop failure of the past season. In that work it is supplementing the work of the county officials and is enabled to do a good deal that the county cannot do. Those people who really understand what the home service is doing in Cascade county don't question the need of supporting it liberally.
