Chicago Falls Before Fletcher Sub Quarter for Zupke's Eleven

Maroons' Hopes for Championship Fade Before Ability of Illinois.

Urbana, Ill., Nov. 1.—Displaying a startling reversal of form and using typical Zupke strategy, Illinois claimed Chicago's championship hopes on Illinois field this afternoon, winning 10 to 0, before 18,000 persons, the largest crowd that ever attended an athletic contest here.

Illinois outplayed the Maroons from beginning to end. The only time when they were within even striking distance of a touchdown was in the third period, when the ball was carried to the Illinois 18-yard line, but here the Illinois braced and took the ball on downs.

Ralph Fletcher, who replaced Sternaman, who was replaced, made all of the Illinois points, kicking a place kick in the second period and going over for a touchdown in the third period.

The whistle probably ended the Maroons' another touchdown, for Illinois had carried the ball to their 3-yard line when the game ended.

Within Three Minutes of End Dartmouth Ties Crack Colgate Eleven

Two Unbeaten Elevens Battle to 7 to 7 Score in Splendid Contest.

Hanover, N. H., Nov. 1.—Dartmouth and Colgate played to a tie, 7 to 7, today, in what was regarded as the most crucial test of gridiron strength in the east so far this season. Tonight finds both teams undefeated and contenders for football supremacy in the east.

Colgate started its attack at the outset, Gillo curving the ball three times for first down. An exchange of kicks followed, with occasional Colgate rushes.

Minnesota Beats Old Wisconsin Rivals by Slashing Line Bucks

Gophers Using Straight Football Trim Forward Passing Badgers 19 to 7.

Madison, Wis., Nov. 1.—Minnesota upset the dope completely here today and handed Wisconsin its first defeat of the year, 19 to 7, in a game featured by the terrific line plunging of the Gopher backs who tore great holes in the Wisconsin line and romped around the enemy's touted ends, Meyers and Weston, for big gains.

Wisconsin was on the defensive almost every minute of the first half and did not open up with its best trick, the forward pass, until the third quarter. Then the Badgers worked a half dozen passes for long gains, only to be checked when other throws were intercepted by the Gophers.

The first period was a punting duel between Lampi, Minnesota's captain, and Sundt, Wisconsin's star. The Badger hands repeatedly. With a few minutes to play Minnesota took the ball close to her goal line and by a series of line drives carried it to her 43-yard line where the period ended.

Late in the second period, after Lampi missed a field goal via the drop kick route, Minnesota recovered the ball after Wisconsin punt, smashed through the Wisconsin defense and Haertel carried the ball over for a touchdown. Ruben missed the kick for a point.

Minnesota completely outplayed Wisconsin in the second period, taking sharp advantage of Captain Sundt's short punt. After Haertel went over for a touchdown, Wisconsin obtained the ball on an exchange of punts and made a terrific effort to pierce the Minnesota defense. The second period ended with the ball close to the middle of the field.
