


Stock Market AS SEEN BY Bulls & Bears

Chicago Market GRAIN AND PROVISIONS. Chicago, Nov. 7.—Announcement that the individual permit system regulating the movement of grain from country stations to terminal markets would be discontinued on November 10 had a decided bearish effect, today, in the corn market. Prices closed heavy, 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 cents net lower, with December \$1.35 1/2, to \$1.35 3/4 and May \$1.28 to \$1.28 1/2.
