

COURT LENIENT WITH STILL MAN

Anton Oulich Will Serve 90 Days and Pay \$200; Plant Was Not His Idea.

The court's belief that Anton Oulich, found guilty in district court Saturday of operating an illicit still, was not the principal party to the offense caused him to receive a lighter sentence than would have been ordered had not circumstances been in his favor.

Oulich's arrest and conviction resulted largely from the activities of his wife, who admitted on the stand that she financed the still with her husband's money but without his consent.

Selo was released under \$1,000 bonds and did not appear for trial. Judge Leslie ordered that a bench warrant be issued for him and that he be brought before the court as soon as possible.
