

ALL HANDS OF WORK HANDLED BY PUPILS AT THE UNIVERSITY

From Saw Mills to Undertaker's Shops Students Labor to Earn Education.

Special to The Daily Tribune. Missoula, Nov. 15.—That the average student at the State University of Montana is willing to work for his education is shown by the statistics compiled by George Shepard, secretary of student employment.

There were calls for 124 odd jobs at the university during the month which netted \$298.61 and 95 odd jobs in the community which totaled \$380, making a net earning for these students of \$678.61.

It is through the co-operation of the Missoula chamber of commerce and the local Woman's club that many of the positions are open to the students.

The largest employer of student labor is the university itself. In the offices, dining rooms and on the campus, the university finds much work for diligent students.

The Missoula Mercantile company employs 12 men and women from the university; Polley's Lumber company employs eight; while the fraternities and sororities arrange for 10.

An interesting feature is the work of two young men with the Western Montana Lumber company at Bonanza. The mill is located seven miles from Missoula and these two young men take the street car to that place every Saturday morning, earning enough to pay a large part of their living expenses.

Mr. Shepard, who is a law student, stated that the next month's report would show a great increase in the amount of student labor.

MINING COMPANY BUILDS RAILROAD 30 MILES TO MINE

Goes to Enormous Expense to Develop Properties in Elkhorn District.

Special to The Daily Tribune. Butte, Nov. 15.—Signalling the completion of the Montana Southern railway from Divide, Mont., to the Elkhorn camp, a distance of approximately 30 miles, a big elk barbecue was held at Elkhorn the past week.

The principal work ahead of the Boston & Montana now that the railroad is completed and supplies can be had, is that of construction of a 500-ton flotation plant. Excavation for the foundation is under way and within the course of a couple of months it is expected to have the plant under cover.

A considerable tonnage of ore has been blocked out above the 1,000-foot level on the Idanha vein, a raise being driven on the ore body to a height of approximately 600 feet, disclosing continuous ore throughout, of a width ranging from seven to 15 feet of milling grade, with portions of this body high grade.

This crosscut will cut the Park vein, at the surface of which an ore body has been opened by trenching for a distance of approximately 1,000 feet. This trench shows an ore width of five feet, all of which carries good values in gold, silver and lead.


