Place Kick Defeats Ohio in Battle With Illinois

Ralph Fletcher Wins Fame by Booting Ball Between Posts Half Minute Before Final Whistle; Wisconsin Trims Chicago.

Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 22.—With half a minute left to play and the Buckeyes leading by one point, a goal from placement pricked the bubble of Ohio State's championship hopes and tonight Illinois stand supreme in the western conference football world by virtue of a 9 to 7 victory. Ralph Fletcher, Illinois quarterback, won for himself a lasting niche in the Orange and Blue hall of fame by successfully negotiating a try for placement from the local team's 29-yard line.

Fighting bitterly for the first minute of play, both elevens displayed ragged football in the first half, while brilliant plays marked the final two periods. Unable to gain through the Ohio line the Illinois effectively used long forward passes which eventually cost the Buckeyes the game.

Opening the second half with a burst of speed, open play by Ohio carried the pigskin well down into Illinois' territory. A long pass by Captain Harley to McDonald placed the ball on the Orange and Blue one yard line. Harley then went around Illinois' left end for the touchdown and kicked goal.

Several times Washington State was within a few feet of the Aggies' goal, but they did not seem to be able to muster the strength to put the ball over for a touchdown.

Portland, Ore., Nov. 22.—Oregon Agricultural College's team won today's game from Washington State College through two perfectly placed goals from field. That was the only scoring, the final being O. A. C., 6; W. S. C., 0.

Williston, N. D., Nov. 22.—Williston today won the state high school football championship, defeating Valley City by a top-heavy score of 72 to 7. Williston plowed through the Valley City defense at will and crossed the goal line in every period. Valley City's lone tally was made in the third period as a result of line plunges, Bowdon going over for the touchdown.

Butte, Nov. 22.—Word was received in Butte tonight that Captain Pythain, stellar performer for Billings high, gridiron champions of eastern Montana, will not be with the Orange in their annual clash with Butte high here next Thursday. Pythain was reported suffering from a fractured skull.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Nov. 22.—Michigan was virtually helpless before the powerful line plunges of Minnesota this afternoon and wound up a disastrous football season with a 34 to 7 defeat at the hands of the Gophers. The Wolverines were completely outclassed.

Minnesota ripped open the Michigan defense at the very beginning, putting over a touchdown within a few minutes after play began. Finding their pile-driving tactics productive of quick results the visitors followed it throughout the game, the play being almost constantly in Michigan territory.

Ames "U" Captures Cross Country Run

Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 22.—Ames university took first place today in the annual western conference cross country run held at Ohio State university prior to the Ohio State-Illinois football game. Ames had a total of 38 points. The other teams finished as follows:

Williston Captures North Dakota Title

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Gibbons Loses Pep Experts Say After Watching Him Fight

Old Time Skill of St. Paul Phantom Missing When He Met O'Dowd.

St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 22.—Although opinions of fight experts who last night attended the O'Dowd-Gibbons fight here varied somewhat regarding the outcome, their opinion seemed unanimous that Gibbons has lost some of the remarkable ability which made him the flashing phantom a few years ago.

Most of the writers gave the ten round slugfest to O'Dowd. Their opinion varied from a shade to a fair margin. A few of the experts thought that Gibbons' flashes of cleverness, when he baffled O'Dowd, entitled him to a draw. Some Gibbons supporters admitted he deliberately decided to forget his boxing skill and center his energies on an effort to engage O'Dowd in a slugfest match and put over his right cross for a knockout wallop that would make him champion.

Since Gibbons returned to the ring several months ago, after months of service as a cantonment boxing instructor, it has been noticeable that he lost some of his old time speed. On the other hand O'Dowd, who served in France and who is only 24 years old, has shown improvement in every fight.

Oregon Aggies Take Contest From W. S. C. by Clever Kicking

Two Field Goals From Toe of Carl Lodell Constitute All Scoring.

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OLD JESS WILLARD WOULD COME BACK, TEX RICKARD SAYS

Joke Champion Seeks to Get Fight With Fulton as Starting Point.

New York, Nov. 22.—Tex Rickard, who promoted the Willard-Dempsey championship fight in Toledo last July, announced today that he believed that Willard was getting ready to come back into the ring and make an attempt to regain his title. Willard during the past week has sent Rickard several telegrams stating that he was very anxious to see him on any important matters. Rickard has been so busy that he has been unable to answer this wire and today he received another message from Ray Archer, Willard's business manager, in which he stated that Willard was patiently waiting for an answer and that the business he wanted to see him about was imperative.

Big Jess Disappointed.
"Willard was deeply disappointed over his poor showing in the Dempsey fight," said Rickard today, "and I know is anxious to redeem himself in the eyes of the public. Willard now sees his mistake in not training conscientiously for the fight and also sees what a great mistake he made in holding Dempsey too cheaply. Why, the night before the fight Willard was so sure of winning easily that he wanted me to come with him to New York immediately to help him organize his moving picture company. He never dreamed that Dempsey could hurt him and the possibility of Dempsey knocking him out never once occurred to him."

Back to Hills.
"Archer told me that Willard has gone into the mountains where he will follow a hard rugged life and try to shake off the laziness which seized him during his training period in Toledo. Willard would not work hard at this time and when any one should advise him to get down to business, he simply laughed at them. He feels pretty badly about that fight and is out for revenge. That is what I think he wants to see me about."

Fight Others First.
Rickard said that he did not believe Willard would try to take on Dempsey when he thinks he is in shape, but will probably look for a fight with Fred Fulton, who has greatly improved under the guidance of Tom O'Rourke. Rickard says that he does not believe that Beckett will fight Fulton in England, but he said that he believed a fight between Fulton and Willard would prove a big match in this country.
