Churches and County Treasurer's Office Only Public Places Which Will Be Open in Great Falls Thursday.

Thanksgiving will be appropriately observed in Great Falls, the usual custom having been followed in outlining the days program. The stores of the city will be closed all day as will all city and county offices with the exception of the office of the county treasurer which will remain open during morning hours as an accommodation to those who desire to pay their taxes. The churches of the city will join in observing the day in a union meeting to be held at the Methodist church.

DICKENS RELICS SELL HIGH.
I notice that "Grip," the raven immortalized by Dickens in "Barnaby Rudge," is to be sold by auction. It is more than a century old and was previously sold under the hammer, and in that period Dickens relics have appreciated in value, so that the bird may bring more than the \$800 for which the late Alderman Nottage obtained it.
It is astonishing to any one who is not a Dickensian to note the prices paid for mementoes of the novelist. Here are a few:
An old sundial and column, formed of one of the balusters of old Rochester Bridge, and used by Dickens in his garden, once brought \$250. "Boz's" writing slope, the intrinsic value of which was perhaps \$1.25, brought \$500 at a sale and at another auction the table, chair and looking glass used by him while editing "All the Year Around," brought \$425.
No less than \$475 was once paid for the pretty cash book which he kept when he was a boy of 16 in a lawyer's office.
