In plain, simple, straightforward language the life of R. S. Skinner, secretary of the Great Falls Commercial club, who died December 11, was characterized as "true blue" by Rev. Dr. Burtis MacHatton, who delivered the funeral address Sunday afternoon at George's chapel. Friends, business associates and admirers gathered there to pay tribute to his memory.

Representatives of the Great Falls Commercial club, the Rotary club, Ad club, Automobile club, business houses and numerous personal friends attended the funeral. Floral displays banked tier upon tier, offered silent tribute to the memory of the man whose friendship had been cherished by all his associates and whose character had been described in terms of beauty and praise.

The services were short and marked by their simplicity. The Rev. Mr. MacHatton chose to talk on "Dick Skinner, The Man" eulogizing the work of the man and the life he had led. In addition to the many Great Falls people friends from Helena were here for the services. The pallbearers were Roy McKnight, A. J. Breitenstein, Grant Call, Ira L. Gregory, W. H. George and Alex. Remness. Interment was impossible because of the weather conditions.

STARVING, NO FUEL MOTHER AND THREE ARE FOUND IN TIME

Wife and Family of Butte Moonshiner Are Near to Death.

Butte, Dec. 14.—When a county health inspector on horseback visited the cabin home of Mrs. Patrick Magins, a few miles southwest of Butte, he found the mother and her three children on the verge of death from starvation. They had been without food for 36 hours and the mother was weakly tearing the last board from a shed to keep up her fight against death from freezing. There was not a morsel of food in the cabin.

Their bodies turning blue from the cold which penetrated through the cracks of the walls of the shack, the three children were huddled together on a bed, wrapped in scanty bedclothing which offered small resistance to the cold.

The visit of the inspector followed a report of the case he obtained from a neighbor woman. The husband and father of the family is serving time in jail, recently having been convicted on a "moonshining" charge.

Steel Workers Vote to Continue Strike

Washington, Dec. 14.—Continuation of the nation-wide steel workers' strike has been voted by the conference here of the twenty-four presidents of unions connected with the steel industry. It was said there were only two dissenting votes, most of the union leaders maintaining that victory in the controversy was in sight. Members of the strike committee

commenting on the vote declared that the recent cancellation by the United States Steel corporation of huge foreign contracts was one of the most favorable auguries of the eventual success of the strike.

It also was asserted that while many steel plants had resumed operation, production had been far below normal with the overhead charges of the company remaining the same as during normal production.


