

# COUNT OF NOSES TO START AT ONCE IN THIS DISTRICT

## Enumerators Will Begin Work in Every Section of Great Falls This Morning—Co-operation Is Urged by Dr. Barth.

Armed with their portfolios and identification cards, census enumerators will start forth this (Monday) morning to count the noses in the city and county, under the leadership of Dr. W. H. Barth.

Enumerators have been named for every district in the city, and a large number will also start work outside the city today. There are 239 districts in the county, and all have been filled with the exception of 25 in the eastern end.

The enumerators will ask the age, nationality, place of birth, occupation and numerous other questions of purely personal nature and will note the answers on the proper blanks. These will later be sent to the supervisor and by him arranged and sent to the census bureau in Washington where they will furnish the data for the great fund of information which is contained in the census report.

Those who are visiting in the city or country, but whose homes are outside the district, will not be registered here. Persons residing within the district, however, who contemplate leaving for elsewhere before the enumerator has secured the necessary data, is urged to get in touch, either with the enumerator or with the headquarters in the city, in order that no one may be missed. It is understood that a large number of Great Falls residents are leaving or have already left for the coast and other places to spend the winter.

The enumerators must under the latest order, make a report on all lines, other industries, on irrigation projects and on all agricultural products and farms.

The force of enumerators who will begin work in Great Falls today received their final instructions and credentials at a meeting on Saturday, when Supervisor Barth explained to them their duty, and the importance of getting every fact necessary. Approximately 25 per cent of the enumerators are veterans of some war, the Civil war, Spanish war and World war being represented.

### TENTATIVE PLANS MADE FOR LEAGUE

#### Dormitory Men of "Y" Held Enthusiastic Meeting on Sunday.

Under the present plans, regular "get-together" meetings and suppers will be held during the season for the benefit of the members. All dormitory men at the "Y" are eligible.

The Minneapolis Steel and Machinery company was given the contract to furnish the material. The work will be completed in about three weeks, according to Mr. Bondy. The new tank will replace an old one constructed of wood, and will furnish Belt with its entire water supply.
