

# FEW VOTES EXPECTED IN CITY PRIMARIES TO BE HELD TODAY

There will be a city primary today (Monday). It will be the first city primary absolutely free from a contest in many years in Great Falls and it probably has never happened since the city got a start in municipal government that not a contest was to be had in any ward, for a nomination. It is an election where one vote will nominate any candidate seeking a nomination and for that reason, all agree there will be little interest taken and few votes cast. There will not be any considerable interest in the vote now but The Tribune will endeavor to give the voters the complete count in the Tuesday morning's issue. ## NEW APARTMENTS ARE UNDER WAY

### V. J. Sjaholm Erecting Modern Home Building on Fifth Avenue North.

An apartment house thoroughly modern in every detail and representing an outlay of \$25,000, is one of the early building projects undertaken in Great Falls this spring. The building is now under construction at Fifth avenue and Eleventh street north and will be ready for occupancy not later than July 1. The owner is V. J. Sjaholm of 327 Fifth avenue north, who is seeking an investment decided that he could place his funds to advantage and at the same time assist in bringing the city's housing accommodations nearer

to the mark required by erecting and offering for lease an apartment house at a desirable location.

The building will be of brick and tile construction, finished with white stucco and each apartment will be equipped with a private bath, steam heat and a gas range. Laundry accommodations will be installed in the basement. Each suite will have three rooms, and the building will be two stories in height with eight apartments.

Excavating is now nearly completed and concrete work will be put in place during the present month. The building will be known as the Chelsea apartments.

## CAMPAIGN STARTED AGAINST SPEEDERS BY CHIEF ANDERSON

### Seven Are Picked up First Day of Spring; Will Be Given Trials This Morning.

With the first day of spring and the advent of ideal motoring weather, Chief Marcus Anderson began an intensive campaign on speed fiends in Great Falls, and his haul for the first day amounts to seven who are alleged to have been "burning up" the pavement.

Harry Cramer, 23, a taxi driver, was arrested Sunday forenoon by Shea for exceeding the speed limit. It is charged that Cramer was driving at the rate of 35 miles an hour. He deposited \$10 bail to appear this afternoon at 3 for trial.

G. J. Buchler, 35, an auto dealer, was arrested Sunday morning at 4:30 on Central avenue, after he had run into a safety zone. He is charged with being drunk and running his car without lights, besides running into the safety zone. He left a cash bail of \$15 before he departed, to appear this morning at 9:30 to answer the charges.

Herman Luther, 19, 2105 First avenue north, was arrested at 12:15 Sunday morning on a charge of exceeding the speed limit. He was released on his own recognizance to appear for trial this afternoon. Luther was arrested on Second avenue north.
