**Rich Ore Is Found in the Neihart Con; Strike Excites Camp**

According to information telephoned to Dan Tracy on Wednesday morning, miners in the Neihart Consolidated Silver Mining company's properties at Neihart made another rich strike on Tuesday while working at a depth of 295 feet. They were working down from the 200 foot level when they opened a vein of ore 24 inches in thickness and running 100 ounces to the ton. The strike is reported to have caused general excitement about the mining camp and is one of the most important discoveries made there for several weeks.

**MONTANA'S BIGGEST YEAR AHEAD SAYS VEITCH AFTER STATE TRIP**

**Milwaukee Road Traffic Official Declares That No Previous Season Has Given So Much Promise as Present Season; No Extensions This Year**

It is the unqualified statement of J. R. Veitch, assistant traffic manager for the Milwaukee railroad, with headquarters in Seattle, that grain crops in Montana are now showing to better advantage than at a corresponding date in any previous season since agriculture became universally followed on the bench lands. With Division Freight and Passenger Agent H. R. Waloske, Mr. Veitch arrived in Great Falls from Lewistown Wednesday after covering the territory west of St. Paul.

"Wheat has come through without winter killing," said Mr. Veitch, "and spring is opening with the ground containing all the moisture it can hold. These two factors comprise all that is necessary or desired at this time of the year to start the crop season right. Weather conditions favorable to the planting of spring crops and a normal rainfall will bring returns next fall that have not been duplicated before."

**ROTARIANS FAVOR UNIVERSITY BOND ISSUE AND TAXES**

**E. L. Cole, James Hobbins and Dr. D. K. Woods Talk in Favor of Measure at Meeting.**

The Great Falls Rotary club, at its regular weekly luncheon and meeting held in the palm room of the Hotel Rainbow Wednesday noon, went on record as favoring the \$5,000,000 bond issue and tax levy for the support and maintenance of the four institutions of the Greater University of Montana.

E. L. Cole, Cascade county chairman for the signing of petitions, was introduced by Rotarian Lee Walton, and spoke briefly on the reasons why the bond issue and the mill and a half tax levy were essential, mentioning the fact that although no increase in building space had occurred at any of the institutions during the past 12 years, the attendance had increased almost three fold.

James Hobbins, member of the Rotary club, followed with a strong plea for the support of the measures. Dr. D. K. Woods, president of the club, also spoke briefly in support of the measure. Petitions were circulated and signed by nearly every member present.

Plans were also made to attend the funeral of John A. Collins this (Thursday) afternoon, in a body. The Rotarians will meet at the Hotel Rainbow at 2:30, and will march to the Masonic Temple, where the services will be held. Dr. Woods was elected delegate to the convention on the International Rotary clubs to be held at Atlantic City, N. J., during the week of June 20. Ira Gregory and Jerry Church were named alternates.

Jones said he would stage boxing bouts at both Tijuana and Mexico and hoped to sign Benny Leonard, lightweight champion, Johnny Kilbane and others.
