NO CHANGE IS MADE IN ELECTION COUNT BY RURAL PRECINCTS

Sixteen More Voting Places Make Return to Office of Clerk and Recorder.

Sixteen county precincts made their returns on Saturday to the county clerk and recorder's office on the primary election of Friday afternoon. Those reporting were Feiden, Manchester, Vaughn, Sun River, Fort Shaw, Simms, Hardy, Halliday, Cascade, Uin, Chestnut Valley, Belt first ward, Belt second ward, and Kibby.

The precincts named all continued to add to the victory of Hiram Johnson in his candidacy for the Republican nomination for president and while not all the precincts gave the now famous ABC delegate list their support, the sum total of the 16 precincts probably would not show against most of them and it

added to the vote they rolled up in the city to such extent that it has been generally predicted that, except for Senator James M. Burlingame and Judge L. L. Callaway, local men, the pledged Johnson eight probably will have the other positions on the delegation so far as Cascade county is concerned and certainly will hold four of them.

On the Democratic ticket, the votes of the 16 precincts named added to the lead of Dr. W. H. Barth, Judge Roy Ayers, James P. Bole, Mayor Louis Newman and Senator Thomas J. Walsh for delegates to the Democratic convention. In the country, as it was in the city, the vote was unusually light.

ROVING MARINES WILL SHOW HERE

Detachment of 60 "Devil Dogs" Will Appear in City Monday and Tuesday.

"The Roving Marines", a detachment of 60 men from the United States Marine corps, will appear in Great Falls Monday and Tuesday in the interest of Marine corps recruiting. Their program, while here, includes a parade on Monday afternoon at 3:30, a show at the Grand theater Tuesday afternoon at 8; a band concert Tuesday afternoon at 3 at Gibson park, and a show and dance at the Masonic auditorium Tuesday evening at 8. The famous Mare Island Marine band

of 34 pieces accompanies the detachment and will lead the parade on Monday. The marines are touring the west under the direction of headquarters at Washington. Many of them are decorated heroes of the famous Fifth and Sixth marines, and others are from the Asiatic stations and tropical posts. Many of the men were formerly enlisted for the duration of the war, and have since re-enlisted.

At each show, a free concert and entertainment will be given, it is announced. Two reels of movies, depicting the life of the marines, and a unique vaudeville show, is planned by the service men. Tickets will be issued free at the office of the marine corps recruiting station.


