

VOTERS OF JUDITH BASIN WILL DECIDE QUESTION AUG. 24

Last Obstacle to Referendum Is Removed in District Court; Election Date Is Set.

Lewistown, April 29.—The county division contest is finally ended at last, so far as opposition to the project in Fergus county is concerned, and the county commissioners have issued their proclamation fixing the election to pass upon the matter for August 24, at the same time as the county and state primaries. By this arrangement, the cost of the election will be reduced at least \$3,000 as compared with what it would be on any other date. In addition to passing upon the creation of the county the electors of the proposed Judith Basin county will also elect a full set of officers and decide upon the location of the county seat. Registration for this election will close on July 10, as for the primaries, 45 days before the election.

Judge George J. Jones of Roundup, after hearing the argument of Warden and Grant upon application for an order temporarily restraining the commissioners from fixing the date, promptly denied it and this disposed of the last step that could be taken to delay the matter, although the sentiment in this city and throughout the county was almost solidly for allowing the election to be held without any further interference whatever.

Six Months Jury Term Is Concluded

SPUDS WILL BRING FABULOUS PRICES FOR COMING CROP

Minnesota Potato King Believes Producers Will Get \$5 Per Bushel in Fields.

Miles City, April 29.—Potatoes will bring the farmers from \$5 to \$6 per bushel in the fields next fall, if the prediction of John J. Cooley, of Brainard, Minn., known as the "Potato King" of Brainard, comes true. Mr. Cooley is in eastern Montana investigating local market conditions and placing orders for seed potatoes.

"Potatoes are short now throughout the entire northwest, and because of that condition, they will be very scarce next fall unless farmers get a bumper crop. The acreage planted to spuds in Montana, from present prospects, will be smaller this year than for several seasons. Seed is very high at the present time. Practically all of it has to be shipped into the state from Minnesota, Oregon, Idaho and Washington has not enough seed potatoes for their own use. Montana is but little better supplied. North Dakota has about half enough to plant a full acreage, and Minnesota is the only state which is able to export.

"With spuds selling in the fields next fall at \$5 per bushel, it is probable they will retail for from 12 to 15 cents a pound next winter. At present they are 8 1/2 cents, with prospects of them going to 10 cents in a very short time. It requires an investment, at the present time, of several thousand dollars to seed a quarter section of land to potatoes, but the returns, if a good crop, will be great.

"Minnesota is seeding a large acreage to potatoes, and in many places farmers are already preparing the ground. Because of wet weather but few in northern Montana have been able to do much field work as yet, but with plenty of moisture there is no reason why an enormous crop could not be raised here. The soil in most parts of northern Montana is excellent for potato raising.

"This state, with North and South Dakota and Minnesota, must raise the bulk of the potato crop of the country this year. The United States will be able to export very little next fall and winter, if any, to foreign countries.

"Other crops will be very profitable for the farmers this season. Winter wheat, now up, is showing fine growth. Spring wheat will hold out during the remainder of the season."

Helena, April 29.—At a meeting of the Helena Clearing House association, it was decided to underwrite the state fair fund guarantee for this year in the sum of \$15,000.
