

GREAT FALLS IS PLEDGED TO SUPPORT NEW HIGHWAY

Commercial Club Will Undertake the Raising of Final \$3,000 in Montana Necessary for Success of Mammoth Publicity Tour Over Route Next Fall; Kalispell Subscribes \$400.

The national park to park highway publicity tour next fall is now an assured fact, following action taken by the directors of the Great Falls Commercial Club Monday afternoon. As a result of the meeting, Great Falls, with the assistance of other towns along the Yellowstone-Glacier Bee line highway, will raise the final \$3,000 necessary to make the trip a possibility.

Gus Holmes, of Cody, Wyo., president of the Park to Park National Highway association, will remain in the city today (Tuesday), and will leave tomorrow for his home at Cody, to start preparations for the big tour next fall.

For the \$10,000 which it is estimated will cover all the official expenses of the tour next fall, \$5,000 has been raised in Denver, representing Colorado; \$2,000 has been raised by Wyoming; and the \$3,000 will be underwritten by Great Falls. Of this \$400 has already been subscribed for the Montana allotment by Kalispell, and other smaller towns along the highway are expected to assist.

Returns From Kalispell President Holmes returned Monday from Kalispell, where he appeared before a meeting of business men, and explained in detail the plans for the highway and the publicity trip, which will start in Denver on August 25.

On June 1, A. L. Westgard, route director of the American Automobile association, will start alone as a representative of the A. A. A., and will make all advance arrangements for the trip, and will make maps and notes to be incorporated in the automobile blue book special edition which will be issued shortly after the completion of the publicity tour.

He is expected to reach Denver on June 12, and a meeting of the executive committee of the association will be held June 15 to 17. The executive committee is composed of Scott Leavitt, of Great Falls, president of the Y-G Bee line highway, and secretary of the local commercial club, President Gus Holmes and F. D. Chamberlain of the Denver Tourist bureau. Final arrangements for the trip will be made at that time.

Mr. Westgard will then continue the trip north, stated President Holmes last evening, and will Livingston and White Sulphur Springs and thence to Great Falls over the Y-G Bee line. He will remain here only a short time however, and will continue on his journey. He expects to make the entire circuit of approximately 3,000 miles, through the 11 national parks of the west in time to start with the motor caravan from Denver on August 25.

Prominent Men Coming The official party on the trip will consist of the officials of the organization. L. L. Newton, president of the Wyoming Good Roads association, of Cody, Wyo., is secretary and treasurer of the Park to Park National Highway association. Magazine and newspaper writers, photographers and others will also make the journey. Stephen T. Mather, director of the national park service, is expected to make the trip. He will be one of the principle speakers on the tour. Scott Leavitt, as a member of the executive committee and the representative from Montana, has been invited to join the party, but he has made no decision as yet, because of other business matters.

Several thousand feet of motion picture film showing the various national parks of the west, will be carried on the tour, and pictures of the various parks will be shown in picture theaters of the various cities in which the caravan is visiting, as a part of the publicity campaign, to educate the general public of the beauty of the national playgrounds.

The superintendents of the various parks will also accompany the tourists a portion of the way on the trip, according to tentative plans says President Holmes.

Will Organize on Trip At each stop of the trip local highway organizations will be formed, which in

the trip will be placed in the treasury of the association to carry on the work. Arrangements will be made by the entertainment and good roads committee of the commercial club to entertain the tourists when they reach Great Falls. It is probable that a commercial club luncheon will be served, and a number of addresses will be made. From this city the tourists will continue to Kalispell, and from there to Libby, thence to Spokane, Seattle, Portland, south along the coast over the Pacific Coast highway, east over the Santa Fe trail, making connections with Mesa Verde, and back to Denver.

Several days will be spent in each of the national parks by the tourists, and an average of 100 miles will be covered each day. "With the Park to Park National highway association fully organized, recognized by the American Automobile association and the automobile blue book, there is little doubt but what it will become the most important highway in the west, and will do much to solve the local problems of good roads in each of the various states through which it will pass," declared President Holmes. Paraphernalia will be carried on the trip in a covered Mack truck, which has been offered for use by E. D. Seyster, a representative of the Mack factory branch at Los Angeles.
