

FRED FISHER, ANACONDA, ELECTED STATE HEAD SPANISH WAR VETS

Kalispell Gets Next Annual Encampment of U. S. W. V.; Mrs. Eva Van Orden of Butte Chosen President of Woman's Auxiliary for Department of Montana.

Fred Fisher, of Anaconda, was elected commander of the department of Montana at the 34th annual encampment of the United Spanish War Veterans here Friday afternoon, to succeed M. J. Walsh, of Livingston, and W. C. Stumme of Great Falls, who were senior vice commander and junior vice commander, respectively.

Resolutions urging a definite stand on Americanism and reiterating the oath of allegiance of '98, to uphold the state, and to uphold and defend the constitution and the institutions of the United States were passed unanimously at the afternoon business session of the Spanish war veterans. Resolutions of thanks were also given the people of Great Falls, the Great Falls Commercial club, and the Great Falls post No. 3 American legion for their assistance in the entertainment of the convention.

That this was the finest department convention he had ever visited was the statement of Senior Vice Commander-in-Chief J. K. Witherspoon of Seattle. McIntyre of that city, who gave the invitation, promised entertainment as good as the mountain scenery could offer. Fred Wolf of Livingston, also invited the department to hold their next encampment in Livingston, but the vote decided for Kalispell.
