WOULD NOT PUNISH WIFE BY ENFORCING FINE OF DEFENDANT

West Side Man Assaulted Wife, but Sentence Is Suspended.

Because enforcement of a fine would work a greater hardship on the wife of the defendant than on the defendant himself, Magistrate George Raban in police court Monday released James Danno, west side resident, on a suspended sentence after finding him guilty of assaulting Mrs. Danno. The trial brought out the fact that the defendant had struck his wife during a family row. Danno's plea being principally contained in this query:

"What would you do if she struck you first?"
The question was put to the court by Danno after Magistrate Raban had volunteered an uncomplimentary remark concerning any man who would strike a woman, and in answer the court said that if it became necessary he would run, but that under no circumstances would he do violence to one of the gentler sex.

In suspending the fine Magistrate Raban informed the defendant that if he ever came into court again on a similar charge he would be given a jail sentence.

"Your wife wouldn't suffer for that kind of a sentence," explained the court.

INTEREST IS SHOWN BY WOMEN OF CITY IN VOTERS LEAGUE

Large Number Attend First Program of the Cascade County Organization.

More than one hundred men and women attended the first program of the Cascade County League of Women Voters held Monday evening in the palm room of Hotel Rainbow. Mrs. L. A. Jenkin, chairman of the Cascade county league opened the meeting and introduced Mrs. H. B. Mitchell who told of the work of the league in supporting legislation along the lines of child welfare, food supply and demand, protection of women in industry, social hygiene, unification of laws concerning the civic status of women, and Americanization.

R. P. Reckards sang, and Frank Polutnik talked on "The Convention Versus the Primary Method; the Strength and Weakness of Each." Mr. Polutnik pointed out as the weaknesses of the old convention method, the corruption of boss rule, the delegates chosen by a few in every precinct, shutting out the so not favorable to certain issues, the trading in convention and the leaving out of good men, the top easy control by money, the dangers of the convention being as it too often was, a subject of mob hysteria. The good points of the convention system, according to Mr. Polutnik, were that it was less expensive than the present primary system, that it developed the qualities of leadership in men and the conventions would distribute offices throughout the county better than the present method. Mr. Polutnik said that the weaknesses of the present primary system as it had developed are that men who were not fit for office can be elected through the ignorance of the voters, it is more expensive than the convention method, it does not bring enough persons out to the polls and one party can control the nominating of the other party. It shuts out rural communities. The good points in the primary system, he said are that it gives everybody an opportunity to express himself and anyone can run for office.

Following Mr. Polutnik, Mrs. Vivian Cameron gave a reading from "She Sings to Conquer," and Mrs. J. W. Speer sang two numbers.

Jesse Owens then gave a brief survey of the constitution of the United States. Mrs. Jenkin spoke on the good fortune of the league in having Mrs. E. L. Norris for state chairman. She also emphasized the ideal of the league as expressed in the words of Matthew Arnold. "If ever the world sees a time when women shall come together purely and simply for the benefit of mankind it will be a power such as the world has never known."

Mrs. C. C. Sadler urged the people present to do all they could to persuade their representatives in congress to support the bill for the protection of maternity and infancy.

LIVES IN DANGER WHEN CHIEF'S CAR AND ANOTHER MEET

Good Luck Prevents Injury to 10 or Plunge to Missouri River.

The frame and front axle on Fire Chief A. J. Trodick's big Stutz car were bent and the motor shifted on its base in a collision which occurred at the east end of the First avenue bridge and which could easily have resulted much more seriously. While traveling at high speed the chief's car crashed into a machine driven by A. C. Viau and carrying eight people. That none of these were injured and that the chief, Fireman Ray Coulsay and the Stutz avoided plunging into the Missouri river was due principally to the good fortune which attended both machines and their occupants.

The front wheel of the Stutz hooked onto the rear of the other car, cramping the front wheels suddenly and bringing it to a stop. Had it missed the other machine it would have gone into the river, and had it struck the Viau car farther forward serious injury to many of the 10 people would have been inevitable. As it was, the chief's machine can be repaired for \$250 and Viau car escaped with a few spokes broken from the extra wheel carried on the rear.

According to Chief Trodick the Viau car was traveling west on the south side of the street and was maneuvering to get out of the way when the crash occurred. The Stutz overtaking and colliding with the other just before the bridge was reached. The car driven by Viau is owned by John McClure. The passengers were members of a choir enroute to Fairfield.

When the accident occurred Chief Trodick and Fireman Coulsay were speeding to a fire in a stable at the F. W. Starling place, five miles west of the city. The chief and Coulsay caught a fire truck as it came by and continued on the trip, but because a wrong description had been given of the location of the blaze the stable was consumed before the fire was controlled.
