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THREE DELEGATIONS TO VISIT THE CITY IN PRESENT MONTH

Plans Are Made by Commercial Club Directors for Reception of Visitors.

Plans for the entertainment of the three delegations to visit Great Falls on May 24, 25 and 26 were outlined at the meeting of the board of directors of the Commercial club held Tuesday afternoon in the office of Secretary Scott Leavitt.

On May 24, a special train will bring a large delegation of business men from Lethbridge and Calgary, to promote closer co-operation between the two Canadian cities and Great Falls, and to consider plans for an international highway.

The international joint commission, which will conduct hearings in Helena on May 26 and 27 regarding the establishment of a water route to the sea through the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence river, which has been fostered by the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Tidewater association, will be in Great Falls on the afternoon and night of May 25.

The commission is composed of from 16 to 20 prominent men from the United States and Canada.

On Wednesday, May 26, the Minneapolis trade tour which is scheduled by the Minneapolis Civic and Commerce association will visit in Great Falls.

A special train will carry the Twin City business men through Montana, and their itinerary includes many of the cities and towns in this state and South Dakota. They will remain here over night.

Definite plans of entertainment for the three delegations was turned over to the entertainment committee of the Commercial club by the board of directors.

The matter of sending delegates from Great Falls to the hearings to be conducted by the international joint commission was referred to the traffic committee of the club.

Y Twilight League for Baseball Planned for the 1920 Season

A four-team baseball league, to be composed of members of the volleyball, basketball and handball players, as well as members of the Triange and Young clubs of the Y. M. C. A., is planned for this summer, according to an announcement Tuesday.

The league would be amateur, and most of the games would be played at 5 in the evening, with probably three games each week.

There is said to be much good baseball material in the membership of the Y, and some fast teams are expected. It is probable that a meeting will be called of all interested within two weeks.

MORE MEMBERS DRIVE PLANNED

American Legion Will Attempt to Increase Membership to 4,500,000.

Plans are made for an active membership campaign by the Great Falls post, American legion, to start next Monday and continue throughout the week, in the smaller towns and villages. The push next week has been inaugurated for the purpose of bringing the 3,000,000 left into the organization.

In Great Falls and Cascade county, it is estimated that over 2,500 are eligible for membership. The Great Falls post now has over 700 members, and plans have been made to organize posts in all the smaller towns and villages.

The operations of the legion has been endorsed by a number of American leaders, among them General Pershing, and Lieut. General Robert Lee Bullard, who has issued general orders, urging all army men eligible to join the legion.

Posts of the American legion have been formed in 14 foreign countries, as well as in the United States, according to Secretary E. J. Fitzpatrick of the local post.

An effort will be made to increase the membership of the local auxiliary also next week.

Divorce Decree Given in Suit Long Filed

A decree of divorce in favor of the plaintiff was signed in the district court Tuesday by Judge J. B. Leslie in the case of Ianne Garner against Llysesse Garner, which was heard by the court on August 7, 1919. The decree was issued on the grounds of desertion and neglect.

Decrees in the cases of Lettie Roney against Orval L. Roney and Edith Roney against Andrew Olson, both previously heard by Judge Leslie, were also filed Tuesday afternoon.

Evidence in the Roney suit was heard April 22 and in the Olson case Judge Leslie heard the evidence March 11. Neglect was proved to the satisfaction of the court by both plaintiffs, neither defendant making an appearance.
