

ARREST THREE MEN, SEIZE LIQUOR AND CLOSE TWO PLACES

Raiders Find Evidence of Bootlegging in Expedition Saturday Night.

Descending again on places suspected as being the location of bootlegging operations, four raiding squads organized by Sheriff J. P. Burns Saturday night searched half a dozen saloons, pool halls and rooming houses, found a quantity of moonshine and Canadian whisky, closed the doors of two establishments and placed three men under arrest.

At the Yellow Front soft drink stand, 16 1/2 Second street south, a bottle of raisin whisky and a whisky glass were found suspended on brackets beneath the bar and seized. The proprietor Otto Hill, was arrested on a charge of bootlegging and at midnight was still in the county jail in default of \$500 bail. A bottle of rye whisky, a half bottle of beer and a bottle of moonshine were located in beer cases otherwise filled with empty bottles at the Royal pool hall, 212 First avenue south. Two men, Charles Larson and Gus Crafte, said to be the proprietors, were arrested at this place and will be held until they can furnish \$500 bail.

Closed by Officers. In Larson's room, over the Cascade laundry, three bottles of whisky were seized. The Royal and the Yellow Front were closed by the officers and the furniture and stock at both places will be confiscated and sold, it was stated by Deputy County Attorney W. J. Tighe.

The St. Paul pool hall, the Board of Trade soft drink stand, the Black Eagle bar, the Armington rooming house, the Washington bar, the Baatz rooms and the Electric rooms were also searched, but nothing furnishing a basis for prosecution was located. At the Board of Trade, a small bottle containing half a glass of whisky was found, but no arrests were made.

The bottle of whisky seized at the Yellow Front was the most cleverly hidden of any found in any raid made in Great Falls, according to Sheriff Burns. The sheriff and Deputy Tighe searched this place, ransacked the premises without locating anything and were about to leave when the smiling proprietor asked them to have a cigar.

Takes Another Look. Hill's joy over their impending departure was very evident to the sheriff. He decided to have another look and in making the rounds a second time he thrust his hand along beneath the bar. About midway his hand encountered something that moved, and the sheriff moved it. A bottle of raisin whisky, held snugly against the bottom of the bar by two hinged brass rods, came into view and then it was the sheriff's turn to smile. The smile broadened when he heard Hill gasp and saw him whisk the cigar, still lying on the bar, back into the case.

The raiding squads were composed by Sheriff Burns, his deputies, W. E. Spain, Albert Marion, Bid Wood, W. C. Bean, and Frank Dorich; County Attorney H. G. Bonner and Deputies Tighe and F. A. Ewald; Chief of Police Marcus Anderson, Captain Fred Locher and Officers Herman Rydell, John Frach and Ernest Goings.

Others Coming Up. Evidence gathered by the sheriff's office during the past week caused the raids to be organized. That whisky has been sold in the city in increasing quantities recently is well established and Sheriff Burns states that methods employed Saturday night will be followed by similar action in other sections of the city in the near future.

Classes Organized at Park Hotel Today; Prominent Men Will Lecture.

One hundred and twenty-five Montana dentists will be in Great Falls Monday to attend the annual short course conducted under the auspices of the Montana State Dental society. Classes will be organized Monday morning at the Park hotel and continued throughout the week, concluding Saturday afternoon. Tuesday evening the visitors will

He entertained at a banquet spread in the palm room at Hotel Rainbow and later in the evening will attend the theater in a body. A musical program will be given concurrently with the banquet. Men prominently identified with the profession will be present from eastern cities to give lectures at the clinic. Two Chicago practitioners who have become nationally known because of their advancement in dental surgery, will attend the classes in the capacity of lecturers and a member of the Mayo clinic at Rochester, Minn., will also be present. Each of the lecturers will follow assigned subjects. Practical work will be carried through while the classes are in session.

Tablet clinics will be conducted by Dr. S. E. Brice, of Lewistown, whose lecture will deal with difficulties encountered in the treatment of teeth. Dr. F. J. Bell, of Billings, will discuss extracting and Dr. H. K. Van der Hoyt, of Butte, will talk on the subject of teeth regulation.

Arrangements for the course were made by a committee of which Dr. G. W. Pelzer is chairman. Dr. J. E. Baker, also of Great Falls, is secretary of the society, and Dr. G. H. Chase is treasurer. Dr. D. H. McCaulley of Laurel is president of the organization.

LEGION COMPLETES PLANS FOR WEEK'S MEMBERSHIP DRIVE

Five Captains Chosen to Head Teams Which Will Personally Canvass City.

Plans were outlined at a meeting Saturday evening of the membership committee of the Great Falls post, American legion, held in the club rooms on Third street north for the membership "push" to be held in Great Falls this week, in conjunction with the nationwide campaign to secure 3,000,000 more members.

Five team captains were selected who will have charge of squads of five each to cover the city, and personally solicit all eligible to membership in the legion. They are William Gunnis, who will have charge of the smelter; Happy Wells, in charge of the unions; J. J. Wuerthner, professional district; Aaron Singer, business men, and George Emerson, city and county employees.

Erect Army Tent. On Wednesday and Thursday an army tent will be erected at the corner of Third street and Central avenue, in charge of Harvey Bloomquist. Salvation Army girls will give the exhibit a touch of beauty, and several legion men will be on hand to receive applications for membership. On both evenings a vaudeville show will be given by the legion at the tent.

On Friday evening, at the close of the "push" in this city, a genuine old time western entertainment will be held at the headquarters of the legion in honor of the new members.

Pick Team Workers. Captains of the various teams will select their team members Monday, five to each squad. On Tuesday night at 9, all membership workers will be the guests of the Great Falls post at a dinner to be held at the Gerald cafe, when cards of eligible Great Falls men, not now members, will be turned over to the team workers, each man taking 10 cards. On Wednesday morning the active campaign will begin, and will continue until Friday evening.

It is estimated there are approximately 2,000 ex-service men in Great Falls eligible to join the American legion.
