

BRIEF SESSION FEDERAL COURT

Judge Bourquin to Conduct Hearings on Matters Carried Over From Last Term.

A short term of the United States circuit court will be opened Wednesday morning, June 2.

U. S. Marshal Joseph L. Ashbridge and Clerk of the Court Charles Garlow and his deputy, Harry Walker, and assistant district attorneys W. W. Patterson and H. H. Kellum are expected to arrive from Butte this Tuesday afternoon and Judge George M. Bourquin is expected on the evening train.

Court will be in session here until about June 14 when it will go to Missoula to open a brief session there on June 15.

No Hurry on Part of Wool Growers to Contract Clips

Roy F. Clary, president of the J. B. Long company, formerly one of the biggest sheep companies of the state, returned to Great Falls Sunday night on a business visit after several days away.

He states that he knows of no activity on the part of wool buyers and no attempt of the sheepmen to sell their clips, but he believes that prices will remain reasonably firm this season.

The J. B. Long company is now running less than 10 per cent of the number of sheep it ran as late as 1914.
