

LOGE IS PERMANENT CHAIRMAN

Subcommittee of 13 Starts Framing Heavy Planks of Republican Platform

APPEALS FILED BY DELEGATES, EVERY CONTEST

Decisions Made by National Committee All Go Before Convention Credentials Board.

New One Shows Up in Effort to Unseat Oregon Man Who Plans to Vote for Wood.

Chicago, June 8.—Warfare over contesting delegations waged so vigorously at last week before the Republican national committee, was resumed late Tuesday before the convention credentials committee.

Edward D. Duffield, of New Jersey, was elected chairman of the committee, 28 to 16, over C. H. Innes, of Massachusetts. William F. Laube, of Washington, was chosen secretary.

On hand as the committee hearings began were Frank H. Hitchcock, Wood manager, and other campaign managers.

Most of all national committee contests were appealed when the roll was called for filing of contests.

Of the 1377 contests decided by the committee, appeals involving 101 seats were filed with the credentials committee.

No appeals were filed from Louisiana or North Carolina. From the former the national committee had seated 12 delegates of the faction headed by National Committeeman Kuntz and counseled for Lowden.

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The committee adopted a rule to limit hearings on delegates at large to ten minutes and districts to five, except in unusual cases.

Filing of the Oregon contest was questioned. Lafe C. Gleson, temporary convention secretary, holding New York's proxy, said no contest had been filed as required under the national committee's rules.

Cummins Keeps Seat as Senatorial Nominee in Iowa Primary Race

Des Moines, Iowa, June 8.—The vote of United States Senator A. B. Cummins, seeking re-nomination on the Republican primary ticket, continued to pile up as returns from Monday's primary were tabulated by the Des Moines Capital.

With 1,138 precincts heard from, N. E. Kendall had 24,225; E. R. Moore, 20,757; J. F. Deems, 18,971, and H. M. Harner, 16,774.

Negro Is Selected Committeeman From Georgia; Fight Looms

Chicago, June 8.—Henry Lincoln Johnson, an Atlanta negro who led the fight of the Lowden delegates before the Republican national committee today was elected national committeeman from Georgia by the state delegation.

MAKING EFFORT TO KEEP TREATY ROW OFF FLOOR

While Subjects Filled With Dynamite Are Cared for in Private, Main Body Holds Hearings on Dozens of Things.

Chicago, June 8.—The real job of framing the Republican platform was entrusted Tuesday night to a resolutions subcommittee of 13 while the full committee of 53 appointed by the convention was conducting a public hearing for all of those who had any suggestions to offer.

LOGE SPEECH ILLOGICAL ONE SAYS CUMMINGS

Not in Accordance With Senate Assertions He Declares.

Watsonville, Cal., June 8.—Homer S. Cummings, chairman of the Democratic national committee, when questioned regarding the keynote speech of Senator Lodge at the opening of the Republican convention in Chicago, said that he "felt sorry for Lodge," and that his speech was at variance with many pronouncements he had made in the senate.

Mr. Cummings was interviewed while on a train on his way from Los Angeles to San Francisco.

"Senator Lodge illogically advocates a stay-at-home policy for Europe while he endorses a policy of intervention amounting to war for Mexico. His speech was evidently made to fit the occasion and not the facts," Mr. Cummings stated.

"The League of Nations will become a majority political issue," he continued. "The people of the United States are for the league. It is the only remedy that has been suggested to prevent future wars. The league is a fact, the issue of whether or not the United States will become a member. For us to remain outside the league would be unthinkable."

MURDER, RIOT PLANS REVEALED AT TRIAL OF COAST RADICAL

Plotted to Loot Banks, Dynamite Newspapers Shoot Officials Destroy Property.

Oakland, Cal., June 8.—Testimony was introduced here Tuesday in the syndicalist trial of John C. Taylor, of a plot of radicals to overthrow the government and establish a reign of terror and revolution.

Edward Alvorson, described as a former I. W. W. official and active in the organization of communist labor party, called to testify against Taylor, said that murder, arson, abduction and assassination were planned by the radicals to gain their ends.

A dozen men of prominence, including public officials, of Oakland, were named by Alvorson as persons selected for imprisonment as soon as the terrorist movement was begun.

Bar Silver Slumps to 84 Cents Ounce in New York Market

New York, June 8.—Bar silver fell in the local market Tuesday about 10 cents to 84 cents an ounce. The fourth slump was due chiefly to reports from London that another severe decline amounting to about six pence had occurred there.

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\$500,000 JEWELS ARE STOLEN FROM HOME OF CARUSO

East Hampton, N. Y., June 8.—The country home of Enrico Caruso, tenor, here was robbed Tuesday afternoon and jewels valued at \$500,000 were stolen, the police reported.

The robbery was discovered by Mrs. Caruso when she returned to her home tonight and found the house ransacked. In addition to the diamond necklace, a pearl necklace, valued at between \$75,000 and \$100,000, the bridal gift of Mr. Caruso, also was taken.

A partial list of stolen jewels, made public by the police, includes eight diamond rings, a pair of diamond hairpins, a flexible diamond bracelet and two gold watches.

4 CARS BLOWN FROM RAILS BY WIND, 15 HURT

Tornado Sweeps Minnesota, North Dakota; One Killed.

Brackeenridge, Minn., June 8.—Fifteen persons were injured, seven of them seriously, when four coaches of Northern Pacific passenger train No. 1155 were blown off the track last night at Foxholm.

When the storm came up the engineer stopped the train, fearing a washout in the heavy downpour of rain. The wind picked up the four coaches, turned them over, and first, which set it, destroyed them.

Fargo, N. D., June 8.—Two members of a Great Northern freight train were injured at Gardner, Cass county, when several cars were swept from the track by a gale.

St. Paul, Minn., June 8.—A heavy wind and electrical storm which swept over the northern half of Minnesota Tuesday night had resulted in one death and injuries to two others and numerous trees, barns and some houses and telegraph and telephone lines were blown down.

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Joe Dixon Candidate for Vice Presidency as Well as Governor

Chicago, June 8.—A new candidate for the Republican vice presidential nomination appeared today when the secretary of state of Montana, sent to members of the delegation certificates showing that former United States Senator Joseph M. Dixon, of Missoula, had received the preferential vote in the primary.

Senator Dixon formally filed as a candidate for the Republican nomination for governor with the secretary of state at Helena on Tuesday. His name was written in as a candidate for vice president at the presidential primary election.

Bone Dry New York Officer's Ambition on Court Decision

New York, June 8.—Federal agents will double their efforts to make New York bone dry, James Sullivan, supervising prohibition enforcement agent, announced when he learned that the United States supreme court had declared the prohibition amendment and Volstead act constitutional.

WOOD'S FORCES CLAIM VICTORY IN COMMITTEE

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Estimate Wheat Crop of Year 160 Million Bushels Under 1919

Washington, June 8.—Despite an improvement of 19,000,000 bushels in the winter crop during May and an indicated spring crop 68,000,000 bushels greater than that of last year, the total wheat production for 1920 was estimated Tuesday by the department of agriculture at only 781,000,000 bushels or 160,000,000 bushels less than the total for 1919.
