ORPHANS SHOW TO HELD HOME

People who are down town this (Thursday) evening will have an opportunity of seeing the 105 girls and boys who are being given home training and accommodations at the St. Thomas Orphan's home. The little people will be "on parade." They are coming from the home down to the Grand opera house, and they will be seen at the opera house this evening in their annual entertainment program. There will be the famous St. Thomas cadets and all the other "kiddies," many of whom will be seen in the cantata, "The Little Grey," which is to be staged as the big feature of the program by the orphans.

Every orphan who now lives at the home will participate some time during the evening in the program. The sisters have been drilling the youngsters for this performance for several weeks, and it was stated by one of the sisters Wednesday that the program this year will be one of the best the home has ever staged. The children have shown an especial ability, she stated, for their several roles, and she forecasts a delightful evening for the friends of the home when they attend the performance either this, Thursday, or tomorrow, Friday, evening.

The cantata to be offered is one of two scenes and requires more than 40 players. The purpose of the production is to raise funds for the support of the home. Tickets are now being sold, and while there is a reasonably generous demand, the committee will continue the canvass actively until the final show tomorrow.

BABY SILVER FOXES ARE MOTHERED BY TABBY CATS TO SAVE THEIR LIVES



The legendary suckling of Romulus, the founder of ancient Rome, by a she wolf has found a parallel in the nursing of baby silver foxes by motherly tabbies at Prince Edward Island, Canada. Silver fox raisers suffered the losses of thousands through the killing of baby foxes by the mother fox. The unwillingness of the mother foxes to have their offspring handled by the caretakers of the farms often causes them to hide their young in secret underground burrows where they die unless found in time. As soon as a batch of baby foxes arrive they are immediately taken from the mother and turned over to motherly tabby whose kittens have in turn been taken from her. At the end of six weeks the baby foxes are ready for a more solid diet and then are permitted to shift for themselves.
