New York Market

FINANCIAL. New York, June 18.—Business on the stock exchange today was again overshadowed by the sustained strength of British and allied exchange rates, accompanied by more persistent rumors of another gold import movement. Dealers reported steady accumulation of bills on London, cables holding around \$3.98 to the pound, or slightly under yesterday's maximum. It was believed that much of the recent buying of these remittances represented payments maturing at the mid-year.

Stock Market

Reported by H. B. Lake & Co. New York, June 18.—Great Northern Railway declared regular quarterly dividend 1 1/2 cents August 2 and July 2. There was increased activity and prices generally trended in an upward direction. In some departments of the list substantial advances were recorded and shorts seemed to be rather apprehensive over their position and covered very freely. The market has recently displayed a rather convincing sign of a rather well liquidated condition and there have also been indications of an influential class of buying in many issues. Foods have been rather active in certain favorably and with the political situation shaping up in a most favorable light the disposition naturally on the part of the conservative element is to realize optimistic utterances. There are still some unfavorable features in the general situation, but these are undoubtedly being ironed out gradually and it may be that the stock market prices and the buying process of discharging a better appearance things later on.

Chicago Market

GRAIN AND PROVISIONS. Chicago, June 18.—Bullish crop reports as to oats and wheat led to material upturns today in the corn market. The close was strong at 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 cents higher with July \$1.79 1/2 to \$1.79 3/4 and September \$1.69 1/2 to \$1.69 3/4. Oats finished at 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 cents advance and provisions broadening out of demand for several minutes.

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GOMPERS AGAIN IS CHOSEN AS A. F. L. LEADER

Veteran President Is Re-Elected for 39th Term, After Defeat on Rail Measure. Montreal, June 18.—Samuel Gompers, veteran president of the American Federation of Labor was unanimously re-elected for the 39th time by the convention here Friday. Gompers' nomination by George W. Perkins of the cigar makers' union was the signal for a prolonged ovation by the delegates who stood and cheered for several minutes.
