Announces His Intention to Become Candidate for Sheriff as Democrat. A. J. Trodick, chief of the Great Falls fire department, Thursday afternoon made a definite announcement that he will be a candidate on the Democratic ticket in the August primaries for the nomination for sheriff. In conference with the city council before the regular session last Tuesday, Chief Trodick was granted a permit to become a candidate, all of the aldermen approving of the application. He will draw no pay from the city while visiting the rural districts in the interest of his candidacy will continue as chief when in Great Falls. Mr. Trodick has been chief of the fire department for four years, serving as sergeant of the police for three years prior to his appointment. Before he was connected with the police department he was for several years captain of the north side fire station. He will file notice of intention Saturday.
