

PARADE WILL BE FEATURE OF BUDDIES BIVOAC HERE

Column Will Form on Park Drive Near Y. M. C. A. at 9:30 Monday Morning; All Patriotic and Fraternal Organizations to March; Black Eagle Band Will Lead; Three Six Round Bouts Arranged for Afternoon.

One of the largest parades ever held in Great Falls will be held here on Monday, as the opening feature of the day's program for the "Buddies Bivouac." Independence day celebration, under the auspices of the Great Falls post, American Legion.

The parade will form on Park Drive near the Y. M. C. A., just north of First avenue north, facing south, at 9:30 Monday morning, according to final plans made by George Ball, chairman of the parade committee. It will be headed by the Black Eagle Band and a platoon of police, followed by a platoon of firemen. Then will come former ex-service men of the world war, all in uniform. From present indications this will be the largest local reunion of former soldiers of the late war since their discharge, as former soldiers from Belt, Cascade, Uln and all other places in this vicinity have been invited to take part.

Many Organizations Entered. Members of the United Spanish war veterans, Grand Army of the Republic, auxiliaries of various patriotic organizations, as well as local orders of Elks, Odd Fellows, Eagles, Knights of Pythias, Knights of Columbus, Modern Woodmen, Woodmen of the World and all other similar organizations will take part, as many as possible in uniform. The committee in charge of the program has urged that all former soldiers appear only in uniform throughout the day.

The line of march will be south on Park drive, east on Central avenue to the Sixth street, north to First avenue

north, west past the court house and the parade will be disbanded when it again reaches Park drive.

Will Present Memorials. Following the parade, W. J. McCormick of Missoula, will be the principal speaker of the program to be held at Gibson park, at 11. Approximately 70 French memorial diplomas, awarded by the French government to the next of kin of American soldiers who died in the world war, will be presented by the Great Falls post, American legion, immediately following the address.

At 1:30 the principal sports events of the day will begin at Earling park. The grand stand has been repaired and a ring erected directly in front. Three six-round bouts have been arranged for the afternoon, the first starting at 1:30 Sports and games will follow at 2:30, for which prizes will be awarded by local business firms and the American legion.

Base Ball Game at 3:30. A base ball game between the American legion team and the Court of Honor team will be played at 3:30 in Earling park, and at 5:30 the annual bicycle race of the Y. M. C. A. will be run on the circular driveway about Gibson park.

Monday evening at 7 a band concert will be started at the corner of Third street and Central avenue, followed by a street carnival and dancing in the street at 8.

ORDERS SHERIFF TO EJECT HAYS

Possession of Real Estate Is Restored to Ellen Eustance by Judge Leslie.

Holding that a lease and option, given by the plaintiff to the defendants in 1909 and a rental contract, executed in 1912, are now inoperative, Judge J. R. Leslie has adjudicated the district court case of Ellen S. Eustance against Mattie Hays and Charles W. Hays in favor of the plaintiff and has issued a writ of restitution in which the sheriff is instructed to oust the Hays from the land involved, described as the SE 1/4 SW 1/4, S 21 NE 1/4 of section 30, township 21 north of range 6 east.

The decree includes an injunction by which the defendants are restrained from molesting or disturbing the plaintiff in her peaceful possession of the property. The sheriff is also instructed to satisfy a judgment of \$79.06, found owing by the defendants through the trial of the action.

The case was heard by Judge Leslie sitting without a jury on April 20, Otto Gerth representing the plaintiff and G. A. Judson the defendants.

TRODICK WITHDRAWS FROM SHERIFF RACE AT MAYOR'S REQUEST

Executive Holds It Not Good Policy to Retain Position and Be Candidate.

Following a conference Friday between Mayor Louis Newman and A. J. Trodick, chief of the city fire department, it was announced by the mayor and confirmed by Mr. Trodick that the latter will not be a candidate for the nomination for sheriff on the Democratic ticket at the August primary. The action was in accord with the expressed wish of the mayor, and Mr. Trodick will withdraw as a candidate. He filed his declaration of intention a week ago.

Mayor Newman took the position that as the chief's office falls within the pale of civil service rule, the best interests of the city would not be served if he continued as chief and made the race for a political office, and after he had explained his views to the chief, the latter accepted the version and stated he would withdraw.

Council Had Consented.

During the absence of Mr. Newman from the city a few days ago, members of the city council, in a caucus session, agreed to allow the chief to make the race without endangering his position and agreed further that while he made his canvass in the city his pay would go on, but that while he was in the country for the purpose of making his race, he would not be paid.

The mayor told the chief that he would prefer that he remain with the fire department and that he believed he would find it a wise course to pursue, as while he holds that position under the civil service rule its tenure depends only on continuing satisfactory service without outlay to assist him in keeping the place, while if he should make the race for sheriff and win, it would mean only a two year term with added expenses and only a nominal increase in pay, when all factors were considered.

Remains With Department.

The mayor, it was said, took the position that making a race before the primary would not be consistent with the civil service rules, and the only alternative would have been the selection of the choice of the two.

Chief Trodick stated following the conference that while he had been given some strong encouragement to make the race, he would remain with the fire department.

Good Roads Reported in National Forests by Inspector Willey

Tourists who wish to spend the Fourth in the Lewis and Clark and Jefferson forests are advised by W. B. Willey, district forest inspector, that the roads are in good condition for auto travel. King's hill and Sheep and Belt creeks roads are reported in good condition. Mr. Willey also states that the road on the South Fork of the Judith, which is noted for its beautiful scenery, is a little rough but can be traveled by automobile via Henson.

The Y-B Bee Line constructed last year between Monarch and Sheep creek is in excellent condition, and no chains will be needed on any of the roads.

Land Filings in June Exceed April and May

Land filings and receipts for June 1920 showed an increase over the months of April and May according to an announcement by Register Joseph A. Barker of the local land office. The filings for the past month totaled 148 and the receipts \$3,833.57. These figures cannot be compared with those of one year ago owing to the fact that last June was the opening of the land on the Teton.

STRAIGHT JACKET DOES NOT PREVENT PATIENT'S ESCAPE

Mrs. Vain Evades Nurse and Flees From Hospital; Committed to Asylum.

Violently insane from the effects of epilepsy, Mrs. Goldie Vain of this city twice forced her way out of a straight jacket at the Deaconess hospital Friday. She seriously alarmed a number of patients at 3 in the morning on the first occasion, and several hours later escaped from her nurse and fled several blocks attired only in her night clothes before she was captured. After examination by a sanity commission she was ordered committed to the asylum. Her husband, George Vain, was with her throughout the day and assisted in caring for her at the jail.

Mrs. Vain escaped from the hospital during the forenoon, and after running a number of blocks met a man in an automobile whom she accosted. It was apparent that she had escaped from the hospital and the man in the car induced her to get into the seat beside him. The return trip to the hospital had only begun when the driver met several nurses searching for the patient. Mrs. Vain is 32 years of age and has a daughter 15 years of age. She will be taken to Warm Springs today (Saturday).

Suhr Assault Trial to Be Heard July 7

The police court case of the city against L. W. Suhr, accused of assaulting two carriers of unfair banners last week, has been postponed until July 7, counsel for both the defense and the prosecution asking for the delay. The charge against Suhr is that he assaulted Joe Dobkoscik and Christ Bohg when they were stationed in front of his place of business with signs advertising the Great Falls Transfer company and the Suhr Fruit company as unfair to the Teamsters' union.
