MRS. O'CONNOR DIES IN CITY

Mother of T. F. O'Connor Passes Away at Home of Her Son at Age of 91.

Mrs. Mary O'Connor, mother of T. F. O'Connor, of the T. F. O'Connor undertaking company of this city, died early Thursday morning at the home of her son, 701 Central avenue, aged 91 years, 2 months and 24 days. Mrs. O'Connor had been a resident of Montana for the past 12 years, making her home with her son here. Her last illness was only of about one week.

Mrs. O'Connor was born in County Louth, Ireland, May 12, 1829. Her maiden name was Mary Flanagan. She came to America when 18 years of age and located at Pittsburgh, Pa., where she married Thomas O'Connor, later moving to Halls county, Missouri where she continued to reside until coming to Montana. Her husband died 18 years ago and was buried at Perry, Mo., and her body will be taken back there for burial in the family lot.

Mrs. O'Connor is survived by five sons, John S. of Townsend; Edward, of Butte; William of Lakeview; Thomas F. of this city, and James of California, and three daughters, Mrs. James Noonan, Mrs. J. W. Giboney and Mrs. Sam Leake, all of Perry, Mo.
