MOVIE MAN TAKES GREAT FALLS VIEWS

Films Showing Parks, Residences and Business Section Secured by Government.

Between 30 and 40 children assembled at the Junior high school building Thursday afternoon to have the movie camera man snap them. Various views of Great Falls and vicinity are being taken under the direction of G. O. Sanford, project manager of the Fort Shaw Irrigation system to be used for educational purposes by the government.

Views of the Great Falls and the B. & M. Smelter taken from the south side of the river were effected Thursday morning and the attention of the cameraman was devoted to the residential and business section during the afternoon.

Several pictures were taken of Gibson park with the swans and the children feeding the swans, also with the children playing about the natatorium.

East face views of the city will be completed this (Friday) morning and in the afternoon, Mr. Sanford and the photographer will motor to the Highwood to take a picture of the Elk Run ranch.

These films when completed will be distributed through the Society of Visual Education, Red Cross and other government bureaus for advertising purposes.

Booze Runners Taken by U. S. Custom's Men

During the past week two automobiles carrying consignments of Canadian whiskey were seized by officers of the U. S. custom's office. According to A. J. King, United States custom's officer, one of these was seized by Deputy Collector Daniel P. Bailey at Plentywood just after it crossed the boundary from Canada into Montana. 
