Roslyn, N. Y., Sept. 9.—The last foreign invader seeking this year's amateur golf championship of the United States was repelled today and the new champion is certain to be an American. Francis Gunn, of Boston, again saved his country's honor in golf. In 1913, he first came into prominence by defeating the English professionals Var-

den and Ray, for the American open title. Today he eliminated Thomas D. Armour, of Scotland, holder of the French amateur championship, 5 and 4.
