GREAT FALLS WINS RAGGED GAME FROM HOBSON HIGH SCHOOL TEAM

Heavy Blue and White Line with Speedy Backs Shows Little Besides Possibilities; Several Hundred Face Dust and Cold Breeze on Side Lines.

Coach Cronch's charges opened their 1920 football schedule Saturday afternoon by leaving Hobson on the small end of a 38-0 score. Several hundred high school students and a thin sprinkling of Great Falls fans braved the whirling dust which a cold westerly breeze kept flying over the field.

Second Trial for Goal Falls. The second quarter opened with Great Falls in possession of the ball in mid-field. A regularity of exchanging the ball and fumbling followed, with McMahon, who had replaced Meisel of Great Falls at right half, contributing the most ground. A final 25 yard tear around the left wing by McMahon placed the oval on Hobson's 5 yard mark. Four rushes ended with Bryant hugging the ball for the second touchdown after a crash through left tackle. Allen again failed at the try for goal. The half ended with Hobson rushing the ball in mid-field. Score: Great Falls 12, Hobson 0.

Possibly a few well-chosen words from the Blue and White mentor before the halves sank in, for Great Falls showed signs of life in the second half. White intercepted a forward pass on Hobson's 20 yard mark and Baker sent Baker, who had replaced McMahon at half, over for a score. White kicking the goal, Hobson then kicked off to Captain Allen, who received the ball on his own 40 yard line and tore down the right side of the field for another touchdown. White missed the goal, the wind carrying the ball to the right of the posts. A few minutes later a pass, Baker to Gosnor, put the ball on Hobson's 30 yard line. Bryan and White contributed 10 and 12 yards respectively, and Baker went over right tackle for the score. White failed at the try for goal. The quarter ended with Hobson in possession of the ball in mid-field. Score: Great Falls 31; Hobson, 0.

Hodges Good Field General. Great Falls final touchdown came in the final quarter after Billy Hodges, quarterback at 90 pounds, replaced Baker. He proved a field general of the first water, driving his team some 60 yards toward the Hobson goal with Huber and Baker doing the brunt of the carrying. A 25 yard penalty for holding put the ball at yard and a half from the tape and Hober slid through a tangle for the score. White booted the ball through the posts for the last tally.

Hobson lost her only chance to score when Harris missed a drop kick on the Great Falls 29 yard line. Final score: Great Falls, 38; Hobson, 0. Unless Great Falls desires an unenviable reputation as a football host, some means must be devised to keep the crowd in the stands. Yesterday's swarm up and down the side lines and all over the field reminded one of the old days at Black Eagle park.

New York, Oct. 2.—America's victorious Olympic athletes today received their official "welcome home" in a parade down Fifth avenue, applauded by thousands.

Led by Pat McDonald, the team's hammer thrower and standard bearer, marching with the Stars and Stripes at the head of the procession, more than 100 of the 275 men and women who won the international matches passed in review.

When the parade ended at the City Hall, Mayor Hylan presented New York's official gold medals of gratitude to the athletes. Later the members of the victorious team were guests of the city at a banquet at the Waldorf Astoria.
