Many Capes Are Worn in Paris

Wise in the changed ways of the world, we no longer look every autumn for a complete revolution in fashion, such as used to happen in the old days, when every gown and suit in a woman's wardrobe might become unwearable almost over night. Individual taste in dress is allowed its way nowadays, in a manner which was never dreamed of in our mother's philosophy. Nevertheless, as summer wanes, we look eagerly for indications of coming modes in the dress of women whose ideas as a rule influence the mode, and we attend smart gatherings with our eyes wide open for any indication of future intentions on the part of the great couturiers.

What is worn in Paris during the Grande Semaine still has its bearing on what will be worn by the rest of the world in the autumn. Some of the early events were held in cool and threatening weather, with great gray clouds overhead, ready to pour rain on any expensive finery. The later races were held in magnificent sunshine, but because of the first damp experiences, every other woman was provided with a cape, and every possible variety of this garment was to be seen, in all materials, from rubberized white tussur, with a big collar of black olecloth, to filmy lace, colored inconspicuously but charmingly in black fox. Many capes were plaited all over, and these were sometimes of serge, crepe de chine or chiffon; many were of black velvet, a fashion note for autumn. Some of the linings were white, some were of flowery silks in bright colors. Here and there, blue serge might even be seen, lined with large figured cretonne.

Old fashioned "darned net" and the modern filet are about one and the same thing. A woman may buy a piece of net and darn any pattern into it she fancies, transforming a comparatively inexpensive piece of material into something that is rare and beautiful and that if purchased as filet net or filet lace would be decidedly costly. Further, she may work out her own individual ideas in the embroidery so that the garment made from the finished piece of net will be quite distinctive and out of the ordinary.

The lace blouse vogue continues unabated for the coming fall and winter season.

These blouses are made over chiffon, plain net or very sheer silk lining, which may be in self or contrasting color.

The hip length blouse whatever the materials used for it, serves the purpose it was intended to serve—it eliminates the skirt and shirtwaist suggestion always emphasized by the garment that reaches only to the normal waist line. Whether it is meant to join forces with a silk or lace separate skirt and complete an afternoon frock, or to serve as a suit blouse, the hip length model is the best all around selection.

Short sleeves are a safe guess for this coming winter, at least. But if you buy a new frock with 1922 in your mind's eye, let your investment have


