NOTED CAVALRY LEADER JOINS ENEMY FORCES

Budenny and Semenov Forsake Reds While Sailors Mutiny.

London, Oct. 11.—The Russian soviet government has sent a delegate with peace proposals to the headquarters of General Wrangel, commander of the anti-bolshevik army in southern Russia, according to a Warsaw report received here by wireless from Berlin.

Paris, Oct. 11.—General Budenny, famous cavalry leader has severed his connection with the soviet government and is recruiting anti-bolshevik troops to march on Kiev, says advices to the French war office.

General Semenov in Siberia also has informed General Wrangel, anti-bolshevik leader in south Russia, that Semenov considers himself Wrangel's subordinate.

Nikoliev, chief Russian naval station on the Black Sea, is reported to have been captured by the anti-bolshevik insurgents.

SAILORS MUTINY

Washington, Oct. 11.—Mutinous sailors of the bolshevik warships in the Baltic have deposed Admiral Raskolnikov commander, according to reports along the Baltic received Monday at the state department. Apparently the outbreak occurred simultaneously in the fleet and on shore but the revolt on hand was suppressed. Disorders reaching the proportions of revolt also were reported at Saratov, Tambov, Viasna and Smolensk. Advices from Poland said these outbreaks were regarded as symptoms of the general unrest in soviet Russia.

LONDON REPORTS ON SUBS

London, Oct. 11.—In connection with the British note to soviet Russia, giving notification that any Russian submarines encountered would be attacked on sight by British naval forces, it appears the only information the British admiralty has that the bolshevik submarines are cruising in the Baltic comes from bolshevik sources. GOV. COX CONFORTS TAFT WITH HIS OWN WORDS UPON LEAGUE ATTITUDE

Democratic Candidate Asking If Change of View Is Not Deliberate Deception, Puts Nine Questions to Ex-President.

St. Louis, Oct. 11.—Governor Cox, speaking here Monday night, propounded nine questions to former President Taft, bearing on the latter's support of Senator Harding. He quoted from Mr. Taft's statement Monday and past speeches in support of the league. The governor asked whether Senator Harding and Mr. Taft were not joined in "deliberate deception."

Who Has His Pledge?

"You say that Senator Harding promised that as president he will induce the covenant without article 10. To whom has he given the promise? Surely not to Senators Johnson and Borah. Every one knows he has not given it to the people. Has he given it to you? If so, it is not so much in conflict with his pledge as you state that he proposes from now on to turn his back on the league—with or without reservations—that it joins both you and him together in deliberate deception?"

Lauded Article 10.

"3.—Did you not also use these words: 'Article 10 is one of the greatest steps forward provided in the league for the securing of general peace?'"

Did you not also say?

"4.—You say that the League to Enforce Peace of which you were chairman had no article 10. Shouldn't you have been more frank with the people by telling them that your plan only had four articles and that your substitute for article 10 was article 3? Can you deny that your article 3 you provide for joint use of the military forces of the signatory powers in event of violation of the conditions of the covenant?"

Did not your proposal carry a definite obligation to employ force and in this respect was it not very much more drastic than the league?

"6.—You say Senator Harding has voted twice for the league with reservations, but you failed to say your candidate

FOREIGN SHIPS ARE VIOLATING VOLSTEAD ACT

Officers Threaten Libel to Stop Importing Liquor Illegally.

Washington, Oct. 11.—(By The Associated Press.)—Seizure and sale of foreign ships violating American prohibition laws is under consideration by the bureau of internal revenue to curb liquor smuggling. Officials were represented Monday as seeing no solution other than through invoking libel provisions of the Volstead act against such ships.

Evidence gathered by federal agents was said to have disclosed that masters of foreign ships frequently conspired with their seamen to violate prohibition laws. The supply of alcoholic beverages has been greatly increased along the eastern seaboard, it was said.

The bureau is understood also to have discovered definite connection between foreign seamen engaged in smuggling and "whisky ring" through which the smuggled commodity is marketed. The Volstead act provides for confiscation of vehicles of transportation employed in violation of that law. Bureau officials were said to feel that although foreign complications may result, they should take steps to control the traffic. Officials are agreed the amount of smuggled liquor has reached large proportions within the last six months.

Technically, foreign ships are within the jurisdiction of American laws when inside the three-mile limit. This makes them liable to confiscation if contraband goods are found on them, which belief was indicated, however, that seizure of a few ships would end the activities of the seagoing bootleggers.

CHINA REFUSES RUSSIAN PLAN OF SURRENDER

Ceding of Privileges Is Not Agreeable to Government.

Washington, Oct. 11.—(By The Associated Press.)—Informal negotiations entered into with other powers by the United States with a view to the protection of Russian rights in China have reached only a tentative stage. So far no definite or concerted plan of action has been agreed upon, but it was learned that no form of international trusteeship of Russian rights in China, as proposed by one of the powers, will be undertaken because of the difficulty which the United States holds must inevitably surround such a proceeding.

INDIANS NEED BUT 1 TO CINCINCH CHAMPIONS TITLE TO BASEBALL

Championship Flag Looms for Indians After Winning Hotly Contested Game by Score of 1 to 0; Left-Handed Pitchers' Battle, Mails Having Better Support by Team-Mates.

Cleveland, Oct. 11.—The Cleveland Indians came within reaching distance of the baseball championship when they shut out the Brooklyn Nationals, 1 to 0, here this afternoon, in the sixth game of the world's series.

Another victory in the contest tomorrow will complete the inter-league affray and permit the local club to fly two banners in the breeze next spring, an epoch-making event in the history of the Cleveland team.

While the play today lacked much of the sensational features of yesterday's thrilling battle it was a well-played contest from a technical baseball standpoint, resolving itself early into a pitching duel between Wigan Mails and Sherrod Smith, two of the leading southpaws of the major leagues.

Mails Had Best of Contest. Mails had decidedly the best of the contest, the batters from the east being held to three scattered hits while the local third Smith's range for seven safeties.

POLAND AND RUSSIA AGREE ON TERMS FOR ARMISTICE

Riga, Oct. 11.—(By The Associated Press.)—The Russo-Polish armistice and preliminary peace treaty were not signed Monday night. It was announced a delay until Tuesday afternoon resulted from the impossibility of getting the Ukrainian text for signature.

There are many unverified rumors of late disagreements. It is known Secretary Lorens, of the bolshevik delegation, telephoned to the Poles and apologized for inability to complete the Ukrainian text for signature.

WARSAW'S HEROIC DEFENDERS REVOLTING SEIZE CAPITAL TO WHICH SOVIETS CLAIM TITLE

Commanding Officer Forced to Resign Command to Carry Out Soldiers Intentions, Compelling Reds to Evacuate-City Used as Military Base; Warsaw Never Recognized Treaty With Russia; Reprisals and Annexation Are Motives.

Riga, Oct. 11.—(By The Associated Press.)—The Lithuanian situation, accentuated by the occupation of Vilna, for the moment is overshadowing the Polish-Soviet peace conference. Lithuanians have issued a statement attacking the Poles and the entente, including the United States, holding them responsible for the sending of supplies to Poland. There is great interest among entente observers as to whether the Poles are supporting General Zeligowski and are sending supplies to Vilna for his troops.

Warsaw, Oct. 11.—(By The Associated Press.)—Polish authorities assert it was ascertained after the reds were driven east, that more than 1,000 Poles, old men, women and children, had been killed by the bolsheviks in the Vilna region.

The group which revolted belonged to General Zeligowski's division which distinguished itself at Radzymin in defense of Warsaw. General Zeligowski, whose forces occupied Vilna, the Lithuanian capital Saturday, has established a provisional government in Vilna, according to reports from Grodno Monday.

TREASY NOT RECOGNIZED. London, Oct. 11.—The Warsaw correspondent of the London Times says: "The Polish government never recognized the treaty between the bolsheviks and Lithuanians, which the latter regard as their title to Vilna. To understand the state of mind of the troops of General Zeligowski, who occupied Vilna, it must be remembered that two days after the Lithuanian-bolshevik treaty was signed the bolsheviks set up an extraordinary commission at Vilna which sent 1,500 poles to their death. These victims had many kinsmen in Zeligowski's division."

TROOPS REVOLTED.

Riga, Oct. 11.—(By The Associated Press.)—The Polish general Zeligowski, with two divisions of Lithuanian and White Russian troops, have entered Vilna, according to the Polish communique issued Monday.

REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE RESTATES INTENTIONS ON LEAGUE OF NATIONS

"Unalterably Opposed to Agreement in Present Form but Favors Association Through Much Better World Court Understanding.

Marion, Oct. 11.—Pronouncing the old order of world affairs ended, Senator Harding reaffirmed in a statement Monday his belief that America must play its part in aiding formation of an association of nations "that will discourage or tend to prevent war and that will encourage or tend to encourage a better understanding."

Constitutional Plan Possible.

"Third—I believe such an association can be formulated without wrecking the constitution that remains the cornerstone of our liberties and of our happiness, without seeking or flinching the sovereignty that is our pride and our inspiration to fine living and good works."

Re-States Position.

"The senator's statement said: 'It seems to me that there should not remain a shadow of a doubt as to my exact position as regards the proposed League of Nations as drafted and submitted to the senate and as regards the great world sentiment for a better understanding among nations to discourage war and generally to advance civilization. Let me re-state my position as explicitly as my power of words permits: 'First—I am unalterably opposed to going into the League of Nations as that particular proposition stands. That proposal is contemptuous of and potentially destructive of the American constitution. It is not favored by the American people. Old Order Is Erected. 'Second I am in favor of a world association that will discourage or tend to
