ALL CITY SALARY INCREASES MUST GO OVER TO END OF FISCAL YEAR

Consideration of Firemen's Request for \$5 Additional Each Month Will Come up in May. Tenth Alley South, Between Great Northern Tracks and Third Street Will Become "Commercial Avenue."

A fixed policy postponing consideration of salary increases to all employees in any department of the city's business until the end of the present fiscal year, on May 1, was formally approved Wednesday night at the meeting of the council, the measure carrying with it rejection of the application of the city firemen for an advance of \$5 a month. The firemen's petition has been under consideration with the ways and means committee for three weeks and was reported out concurrently with the recommendation that the council definitely dispose of all similar matters likely to be initiated before the next annual budget is compiled. The committee's report won the affirmative vote of the council present except John Wilson, G. A. Bosley and G. L. Sleery, who represent the citizens-labor party in the council. In its report the ways and means committee, on the measure coming up for the position taken last week by its chairman, George B. Calvert. The firemen based their request on the assertion that increases allowed to the privates of the department were not proportionate to advances given the officers. **Alley To Be "Commercial Avenue"** Tenth alley south between the Great Northern tracks and Third street will lose its identity as such under an ordinance passed on first reading. Recently this portion of the alley has become a thoroughfare in the city and house districts and the ordinance will provide that its name be changed to Commercial avenue, the only thoroughfare in Great Falls other than Park Drive not designated by the city council. The ordinance extended the new name over the entire length of the alley, but Alderman Barney Joyce asked that the alley's identity be preserved east of Third street. Mayor Louis Newman, the ordinance approved an alteration to this effect will appear. The ordinance was drawn by City Attorney LaRue Smith. **Lots To Be Sold to County** Lot 4, block 81, will be sold by the city to Cascade county at a price to be fixed by the ways and means committee and Mayor Louis Newman. The sale was recently requested by the county commissioners, who will use the ground for storage. All of the lots in this half of block 81 were originally purchased by the city and county with the understanding that the city was to have three lots and the county four. Until now the fourth lot has never been taken over by the county. Notice will be given to property owners on Third avenue south, between Seventh and Thirteenth streets, that within 10 days after receipt of the notices they must install water services necessary to the construction of paving. If within that period the services are not installed the work will be done by the city contractor and charged against the property. The decision was reached on report of the public improvement committee. **Permits for Signs Asked** Applications for special sign permits from the Alcazar theater and from M. Sugar, 218 First avenue south, were referred to the public welfare committee. Both firms desire to erect temporary canvas signs extending over the sidewalk. An application from Carl Weisman for a junk business license was referred to the public welfare committee. A permit to construct a 60-foot vent in the plumbing at 16 Third street south was issued on motion of Alderman G. T. Boyd. An ordinance fixes the length of such vents at 30 feet unless a special permit is obtained. The application of Mary A. Carter, a resident, for a refund of penalties and interest imposed because of the non-payment of a special improvement tax was reported out by the judiciary committee. The committee found that the delinquency occurred through no fault of the owner and that the penalties for the years 1912, 1913 and 1916 and one-half the interest should be remitted, the council approving. J. A. McDonough appeared before the committee in behalf of Mrs. Carter. **Lost Bond to Be Duplicated** A duplicate \$1,000 water refunding bond of the issue of 1913 will be forwarded to M. C. Miller of Los Angeles as soon as she furnishes a bond indemnifying the city against possible loss in connection with the original bond, which has been stolen from the owner. This action was recommended by City Attorney Smith, Treasurer W. P. Wren and the judiciary committee. A final checking of accounts between the city and Contractor F. E. Evans over construction of the new water mains will be made by the water committee and the public improvement committee before the work is accepted. Alderman Boyd asked that the water committee have the assistance of the public improvement committee in this work and the council granted the request. While the two committees are in session they will pass on the recom-
