Great Falls' high school's football team will encounter what is probably the heaviest and fastest high school team in the state next Saturday at Earl- ings park, when it will meet Billings.

Next Saturday's game in Great Falls will eliminate one of the four possible claimants for the state high school title. Great Falls' defensive game, which has not yet been given a real trial, will be the test.

Whether the Great Falls defense will show sufficient versatility when con- fronted by a team of equal strength is the big question for next Saturday.



Gloucester, Mass., Oct. 25.—The fish- ing schooner Esperanto, "sliced up" like a millionaire's yacht put out to sea to- day to the cheers of every old salt and young sailor in this port, bound for Hal- ifax, N. S., where she will meet the crack Canadian fisher craft Delavanua, in a series of races for the cham- pionship of the North Atlantic.

The Esperanto showed her nautical heels to crowds which lined every wharf and packed craft of every description.

Short run, a bear back and a bit of sail shifting to let the home folks know how she behaved was Captain Welch's way of showing his appreciation of the rousing send-off and hearty Godspeed given Esperanto and her crew.

Captain Welch received before sailing a telegram from Senator Harding, Re- publican candidate for president, wishing him success.

Replying, Captain Welch said: "We expect to bring Old Glory over the finish line again in the lead but if we do not our Canadian cousins will know we have been in a race."

All sail was set as the schooner slipped out of view, and with a fair start it was expected her skipper would bring her to anchor at Halifax Wednesday af- ternoon.

STATE FAIR PRIZES COME TO CASCADE

Ruby Cosman Notified She Re- ceived Three Firsts and a Second for Poultry.

The winning of three more first prizes and a second on a pen of poultry exhibited at the state fair at Helena in September by Miss Ruby Cosman of Cascade makes the prizes taken by the Boys and Girls' clubs of Cascade county this year total 45, as many as were won by the whole state last year.

Last year although Cascade county only won 22 prizes it finished first in the state. This work is carried on by the farm bureau project with Miss Jane Keeney as county project leader.

Miss Cosman was given first place on a pen of Rhode Island chickens, first on cockle, first on pullet and second on hen.

When notified of Miss Cosman's suc- cess Monday, County Agent F. E. Mac- Spadden, said, "The winning of these prizes by Miss Cosman is remarkable for the competition was especially keen among the Rhode Island Red chickens. It shows that Miss Cosman must have taken wonderful care of her chickens."

At present Cascade county has been awarded 20 first prizes, 12 second prizes, seven thirds, three fourths, one fifth, one sixth, and one seventh out exhibits at the state fair.
