**\$618,084 IN TAXES
FROM 14 COMPANIES
IN CASCADE COUNTY**

Great Northern's Levy Highest,
A. C. M. Is Next and Town-
site Company Third.

With \$175,394 levied against its Cas-
cade county property, the Great North-
ern railway this year continues to be
the largest taxpayer in the county. Its
assessment exceeds by approximately
\$20,000 that of the Anaconda Copper
Mining company, the next largest, which
will pay \$155,481. The Great North-
ern's assessment includes the tax on the
road's tracks, right-of-way, yardage prop-
erty, stations, shops, equipment and
real estate.

The Great Northern's tax bill for
1920 was made known Thursday by
County Treasurer Fred C. Andretta fol-
lowing the completion of the annual cor-
poration book. The Anaconda company's
assessment this year is \$155,481. The
Great Falls Townsite company will pay
\$49,086, the Great Falls Power company
\$114,358, the Montana Power company
\$26,698 and the Milwaukee railway
\$19,330.
