

REPUBLICANS WIN ALL COUNTY OFFICES BUT ONE IN FERGUS

Judge Ayers Is Sole Democratic Survivor—Wounded Veteran Gets High Vote.

Lewistown, Nov. 5.—Most of the newly elected county officers will go in with majorities that are simply overwhelming and all of them are decisive. All the winners of county offices are Republicans, though Judge Roy A. Ayers, Democrat, is re-elected to the district bench by the largest lead of any Fergus county man.

Bert Replogle, a gallant soldier who left a leg on the battlefield in France and was defeated for the Democratic nomination by a Nonpartisan, ran as a Republican and led the whole winning ticket. The Republicans took it for granted that "Rep" would be named as a Democrat and as a compliment to the soldier, left the place, clerk of the court, vacant on their own ticket. Fortunately a lot of Republicans voted for him at the primary, making him the Republican candidate. His majority over Abbott, Nonpartisan-Democrat, is far above 3,000. The others elected are:

State representatives—J. H. Charters, mayor of Grass Range and a prominent merchant there; C. L. Covell, a Lewistown business man; H. F. Geis, a young attorney at Winnett, who served in the navy during the war, and Albert Johnson, a Denton business man.

For commissioner Oscar Anderson, a young stockman of Winfred is the winner. He has served as a state representative.

For sheriff W. R. Woods, Jr., son of "Billy" Woods a former sheriff, is elected by the second highest majority accorded any candidate. Woods is a native son, a university man, and is in the stock business.

For clerk and recorder Louis Lehman, long manager of the mercantile house of Lehman & Company, received a heavy majority.

Horace G. Phillips, one of the oldest business men of the county, is elected treasurer over Hazel Hill.

Edgar J. Baker, formerly of Butte, is elected county attorney.

Fred Sherman, an insurance man, is elected assessor and S. L. Ramey succeeds his chief, Hal Tilzey, as surveyor, while C. P. Wilder, a Lewistown physician, becomes coroner and W. H. Grant, a Denton attorney is the next public administrator. Miss Ananida Swift is re-elected county superintendent and Julia Van Iderstein, widow of a well known Spanish war veteran, will be the next auditor.

Hill County G. O. P. Candidates Winners Down Entire List

Havre, Nov. 5.—With a few precincts to be hard from it is apparent that the entire Republican county ticket for Hill county has pulled through with safe majorities for every candidate. Charles A. Rose, Republican candidate for judge of the judicial district of Hill, Blaine and Liberty counties, was elected over his Democratic opponent, C. R. Stranahan.

For president Harding carried the county by a vote of 1824 against 1218 for Cox, according to returns from 27 precincts. For congress Riddick received 2085 to 1453 for McCusker.

Patterson, auditor; Charles Grau, surveyor; Elizabeth Ireland, superintendent of schools.

CIRCLE IS SELECTED FOR THE PERMANENT SEAT M'COONE COUNTY

Wins the Prize With a Vote of 1,122 Over That of 1,088 for Its Competitor.

Wolf Point, Nov. 5.—The town of Circle becomes the permanent seat of government of McCone county, one of the new sub-divisions of Montana which was created by legislative enactment during the session of 1919. The bill made Circle the temporary county seat and left the selection of a permanent site to the voters of the county.

During the recent campaign the fight for the prize was conducted between Circle, which is southeast of the center of the county and on the survey of the

proposed Great Northern cut-off between Great Falls and New Rockford, N. D., and the town of Vida, situated northwest of the center of the county. The unofficial tabulation of the vote on this question shows Circle leading with 1,122 votes and with Vida a close second, 1,088.
